

Latino Voters in the 2021 Recall Election



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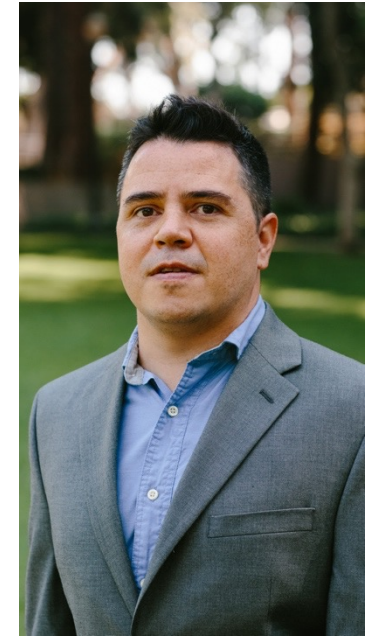
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Executive Summary

- Latino voters mobilized later than others. The single-biggest day of Latino votes was September 14, 2021, the day of the recall election.
- In most counties, support for Governor Newsom increased as the concentration of Latino voters in precincts increased.
- Statewide, an estimated 78.1% of Latinos voted against the recall election. High support for Governor Newsom among Latinos is broadly unchanged from the 2018 election.
- Regionally, the most important patterns are:
 - In Southern California, Latino support for Governor Newsom was upwards of 75%, even in historically Republican Counties like Orange and Riverside County.
 - In Central California, Latino voters were more likely to vote opposite of non-Latino voters.
 - Support for Governor Newsom among Latinos was highest in the Bay Area. Contra Costa displayed the strongest Latino support for Governor Newsom with 93% of Latinos rejecting the recall.
 - In Northern California, Governor Newsom received a similar share of votes compared to 2018.
- Similar to non-Latinos, the majority of Latinos voters cast their ballot by mail. However, in Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Tulare counties, Latino voters were more likely to vote in-person when compared to non-Latinos.

Methodology

- **Data sources:** County Registrars of voters provide recall election data at the precinct-level (2021). The share of Latino voters in each precinct comes from UC Berkeley’s statewide election database.
- We match precinct-level data on votes cast in the 2021 recall to the estimated percentage of Latino voters in recent elections.
 - The share of Latino voters in each precinct is estimated from data in the 2020 general election in all counties.
 - For Santa Clara, we use demographics from the 2018 gubernatorial election.
 - For Riverside, we match to demographics from both the 2018 gubernatorial and 2020 general.
 - Precincts for which we do not have a match between the 2018/2020 and 2021 elections were excluded.
 - We also exclude precincts a) that lack valid Latino demographic data or b) that have fewer than 25 votes.
- To estimate the percentage of Latino voters who voted “Yes” and “No” we fit a Loess regression line. For the 2021 statewide election results, we estimate the percentage of Latino votes using a King’s ecological inference model.
- This data analysis is more reliable than exit polls because it uses actual data on votes cast and historical election data. Exit polls are often subject to several biases.

- The 18 counties in our analysis represent 81.4% of California’s population and 81.5% of the state’s Latino population (2020 Census).



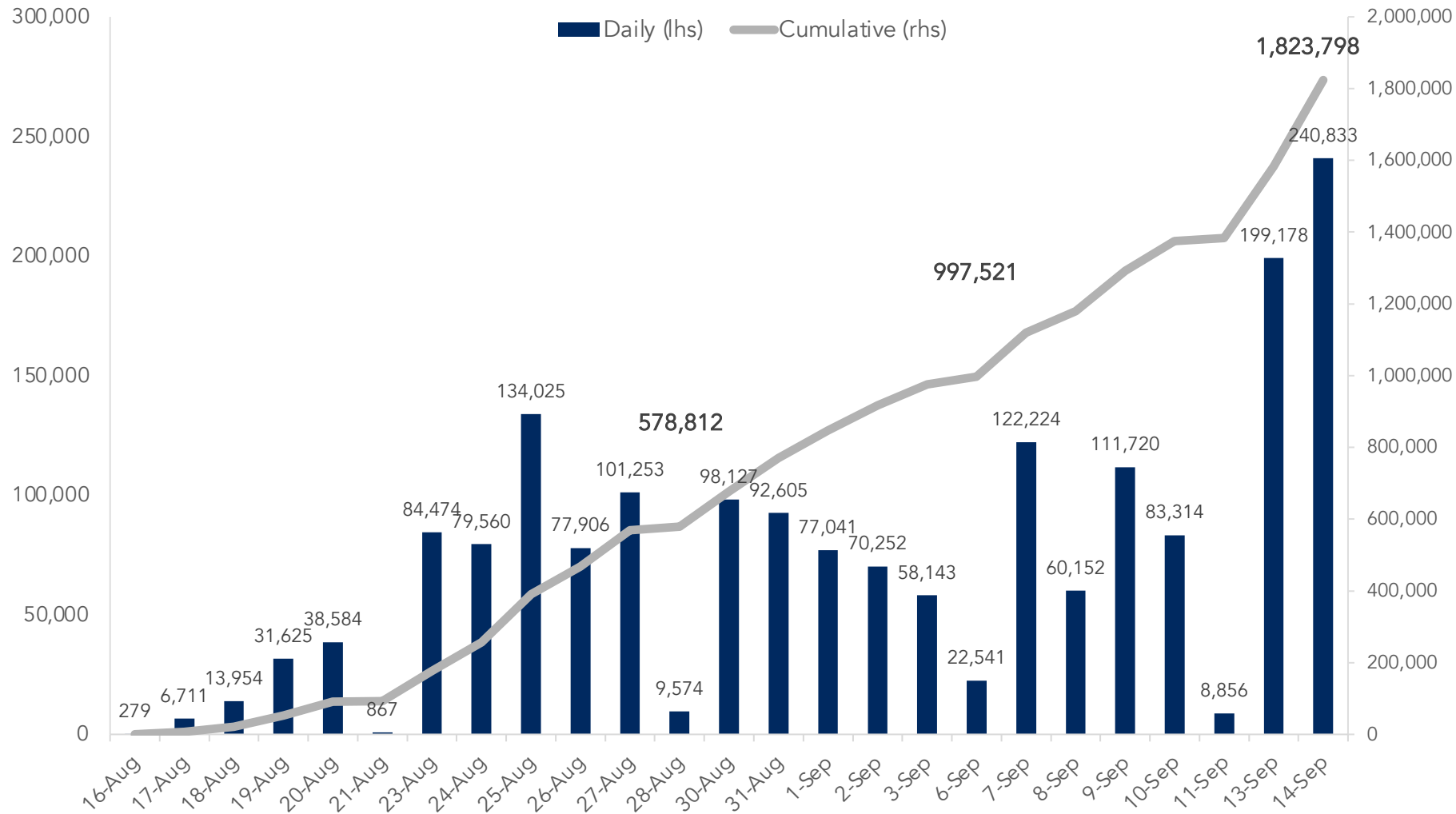
Orrin Heatlie's Notice of Intent to California Secretary of State for Recall Petition

TO THE HONORABLE GAVIN NEWSOM: Pursuant to section 11020, California Elections Code, the undersigned registered qualified voters of the State of California, hereby give notice, we are the proponents of a recall petition and we intend to seek your recall and removal from the office of Governor in the State of California and to demand election of a successor in that office. The grounds for this recall are as follows: Governor Newsom has implemented laws which are detrimental to the citizens of this state and our way of life. Laws he endorsed favor foreign nationals, in our country illegally, over that of our own citizens. People in this state suffer the highest taxes in the nation, the highest homelessness rates, and the lowest quality of life as a result. He has imposed sanctuary state status and fails to enforce immigration laws. He unilaterally over-ruled the will of the people regarding the death penalty. He seeks to impose additional burdens on our state by the following; removing the protections of Proposition 13, rationing our water use, increasing taxes and restricting parental rights. Having no other recourse, we the people have come together to take this action, remedy these misdeeds and prevent further injustices.

Context: The Recall and Latino Voters

- The recall petition, started by a retired county sheriff's sergeant, explicitly called out immigration, taxes, homelessness, criminal justice, and quality of life as reasons for the recall.
- Since the last recall in 2003, UCLA LPPI estimates that there has been nearly a 150% increase of Latino voters and 122% increase for Asian American. During the past 20 years, the growth of white voters in California was 5%.
- In the 2020 election, Latinos composed:
 - 32% of the total citizen population in CA (8.3m people)
 - 27.9% of registered voters in CA (5.0m people)
 - 26.8% of total voters in CA (4.5m people)

Latino Votes Doubled Once In-Person Voting Began



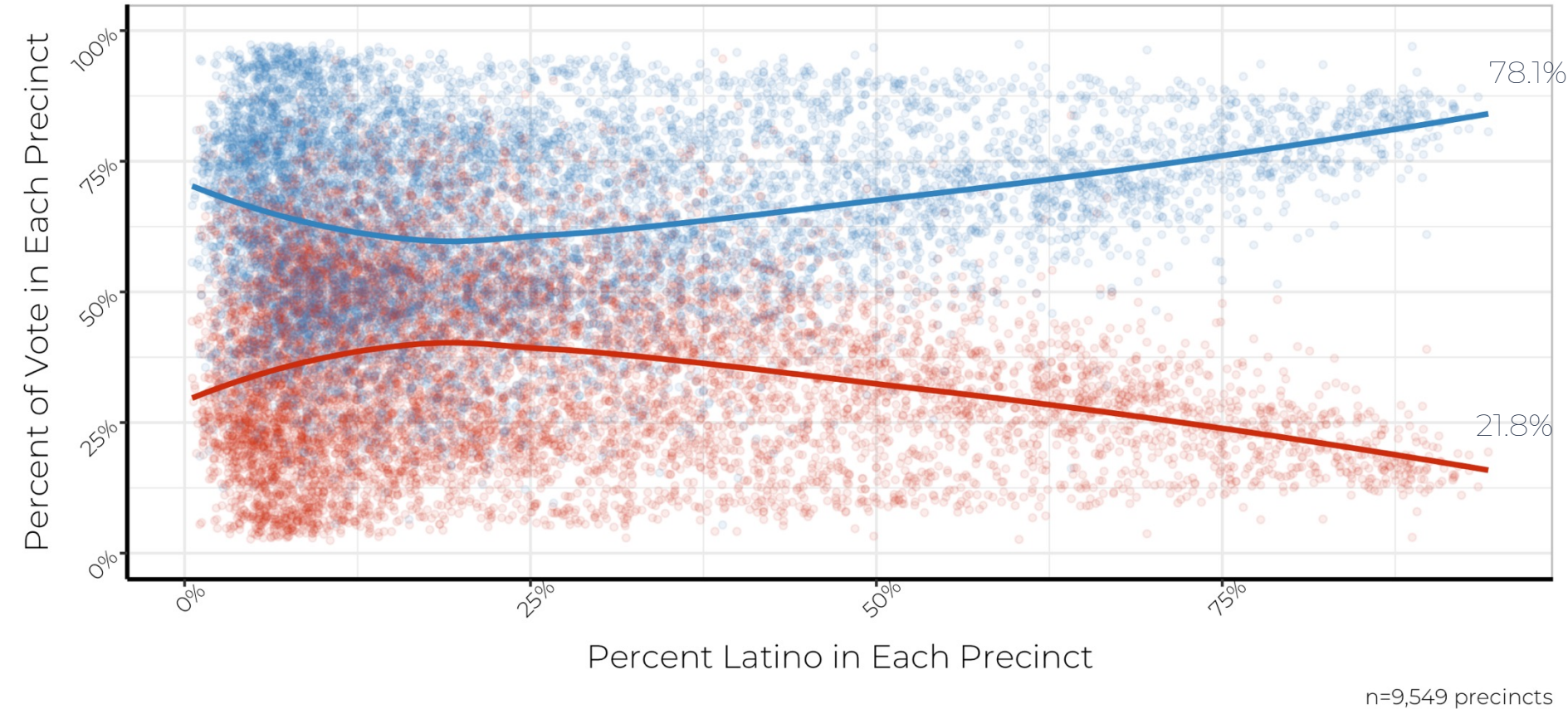
- Latino votes doubled once in-person voting opened.
- The single-biggest day of Latino votes was September 14, 2021, the day of the recall election.
- Total Latino turnout stands at 1,823,798 statewide.
- Latino voter turnout was 30%.

- Statewide, an estimated 78.1% of Latinos voted against the recall.
- An estimated 60.7% of non-Latinos statewide voted against the recall.
- Overall, 61.9% of Californians voted “No” on the recall.

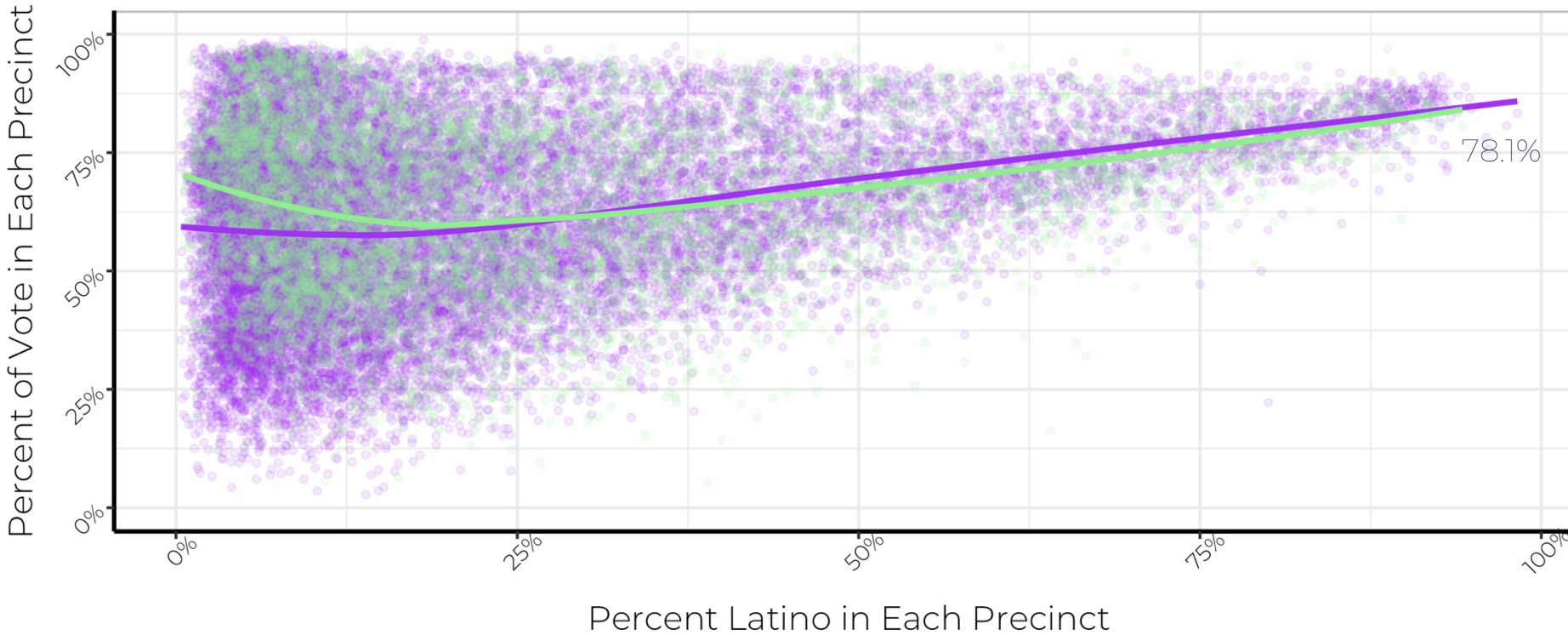

- In high-density Latino precincts, support for Governor Newsom was nearly identical with the 2018 election.

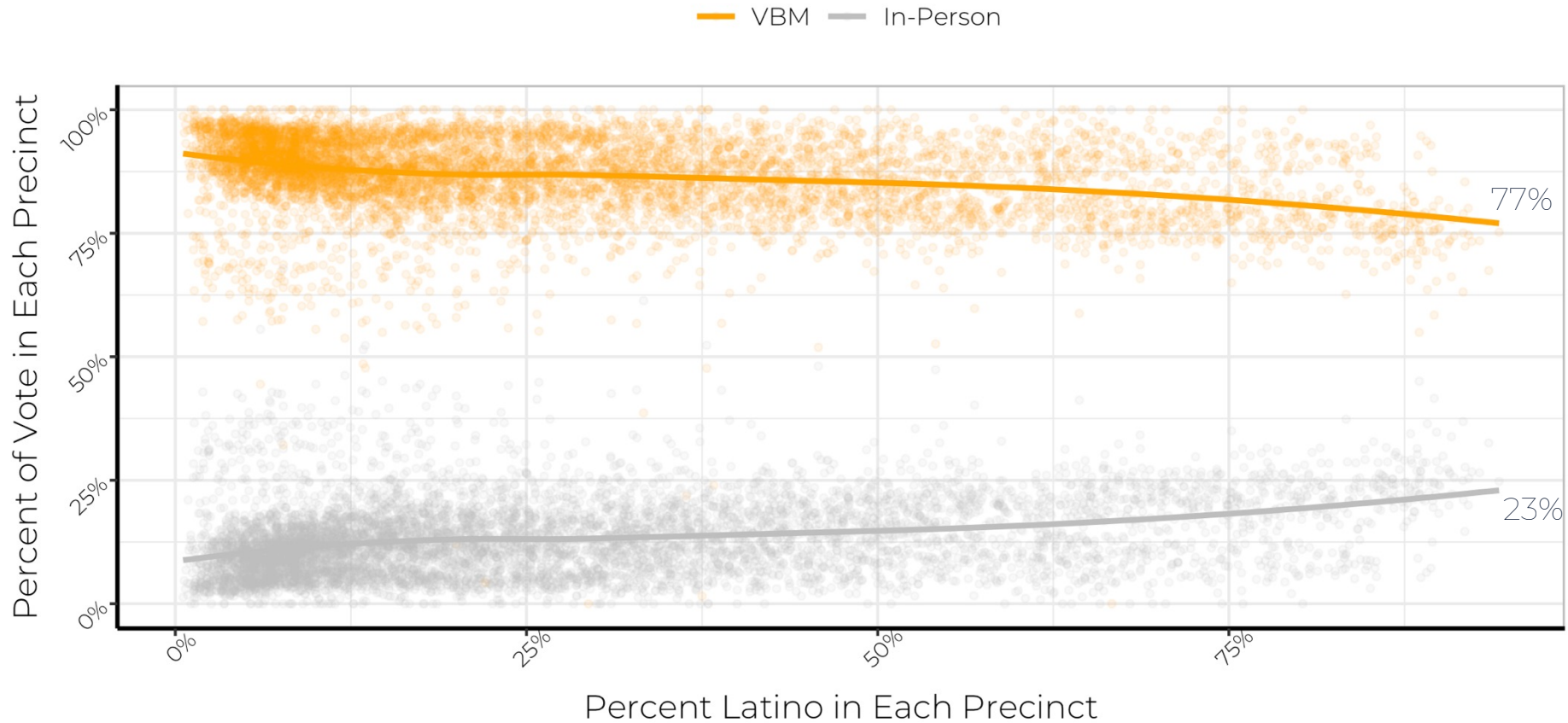

- In high-density Latino precincts statewide, 77 percent of Latino voters voted by mail.

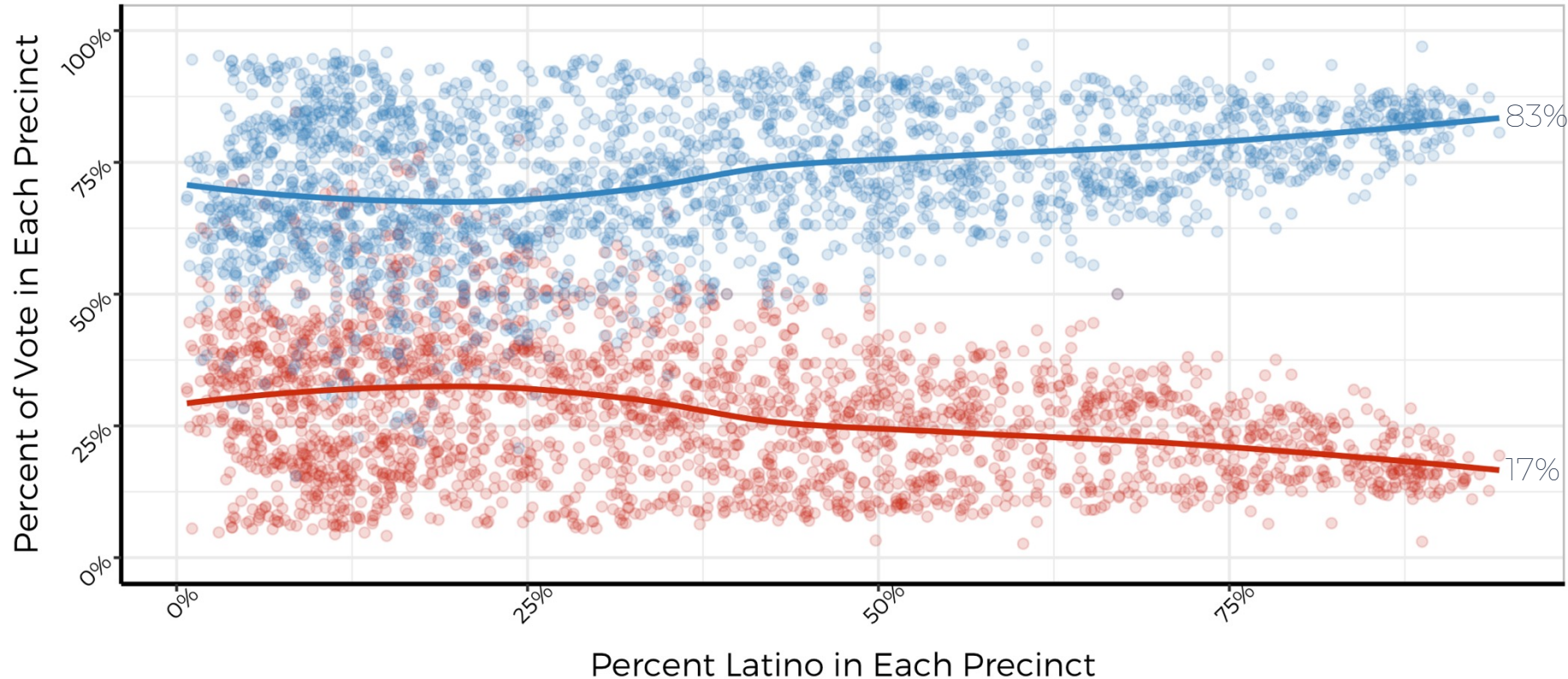

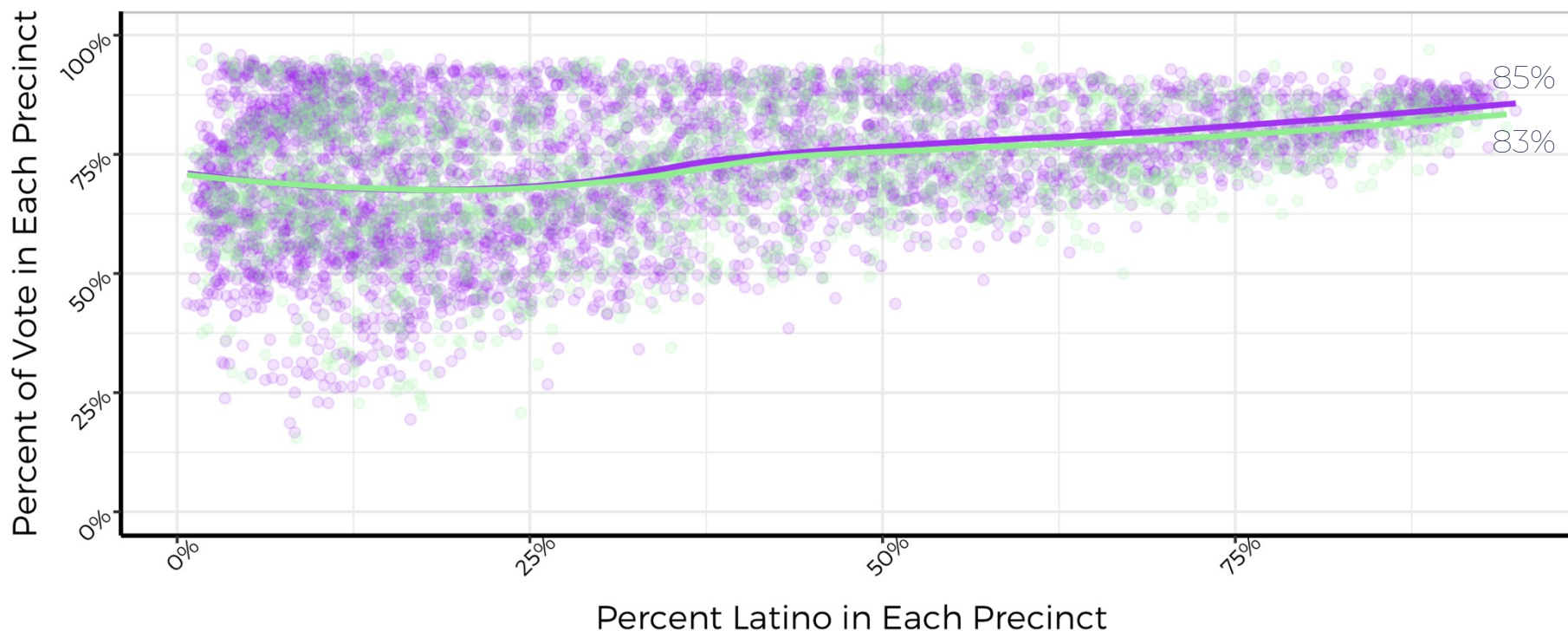


- In Los Angeles County, an estimated 83% of Latinos voted against the recall.

- Overall, 70.8% of Angelenos voted “No” on the recall.

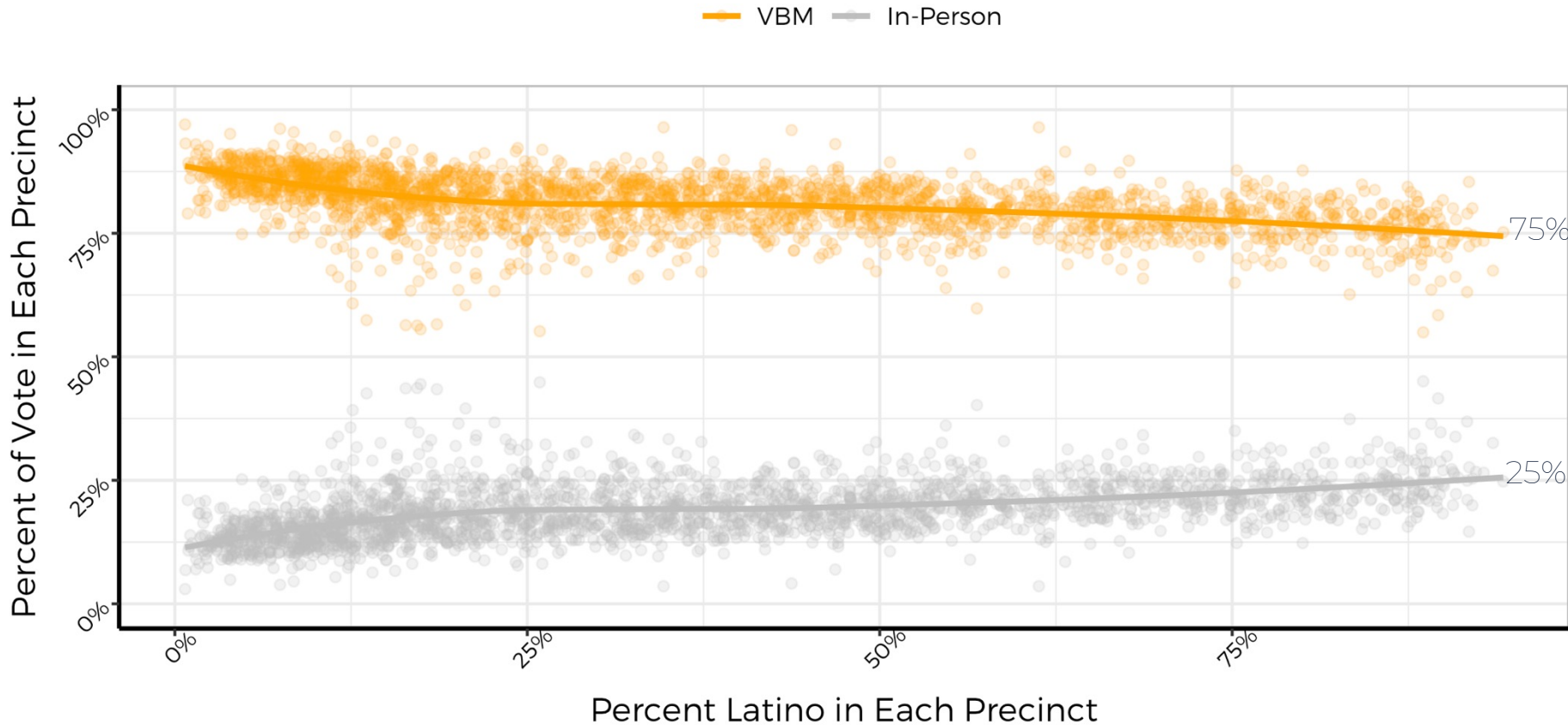

- Although support for the Governor was almost identical, Newsom fell 2 percentage points between the 2018 election and the 2021 recall.

Los Angeles County



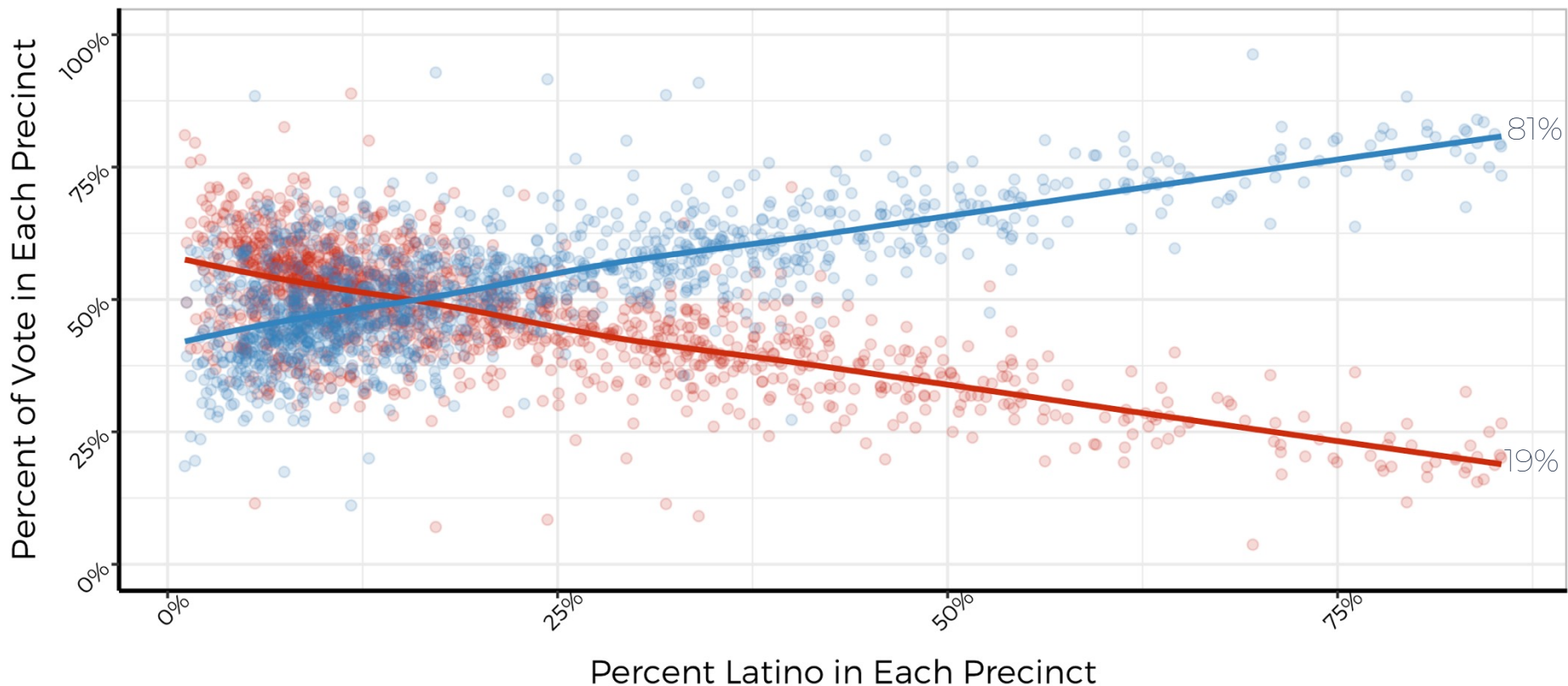

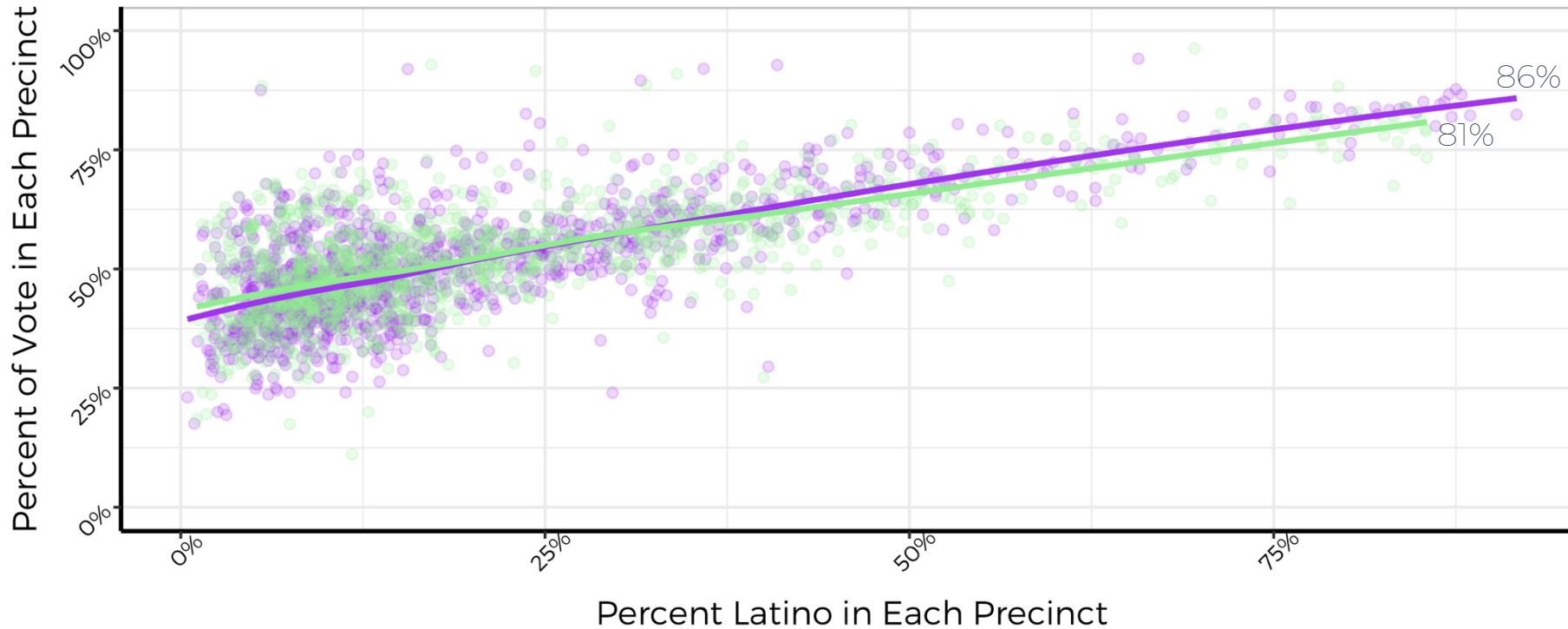


- Despite Orange County's reputation as a Republican stronghold, 81% of Latinos voted against the recall of Governor Newsom.
- In contrast, only 40% of non-Latino voters in Orange County voted "No" on the recall of Governor Newsom.
- Overall, 51.7% of Orange County voted "No" on the recall.

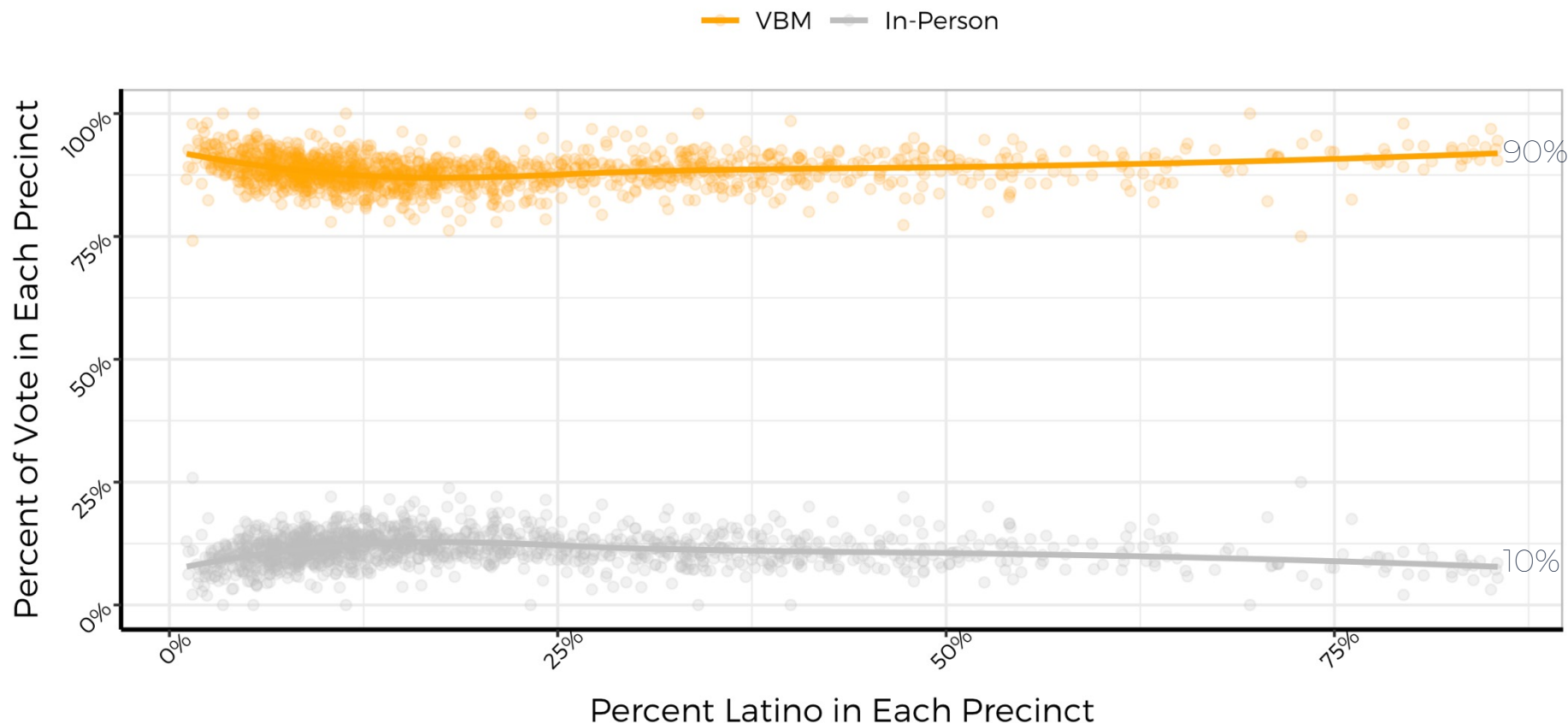

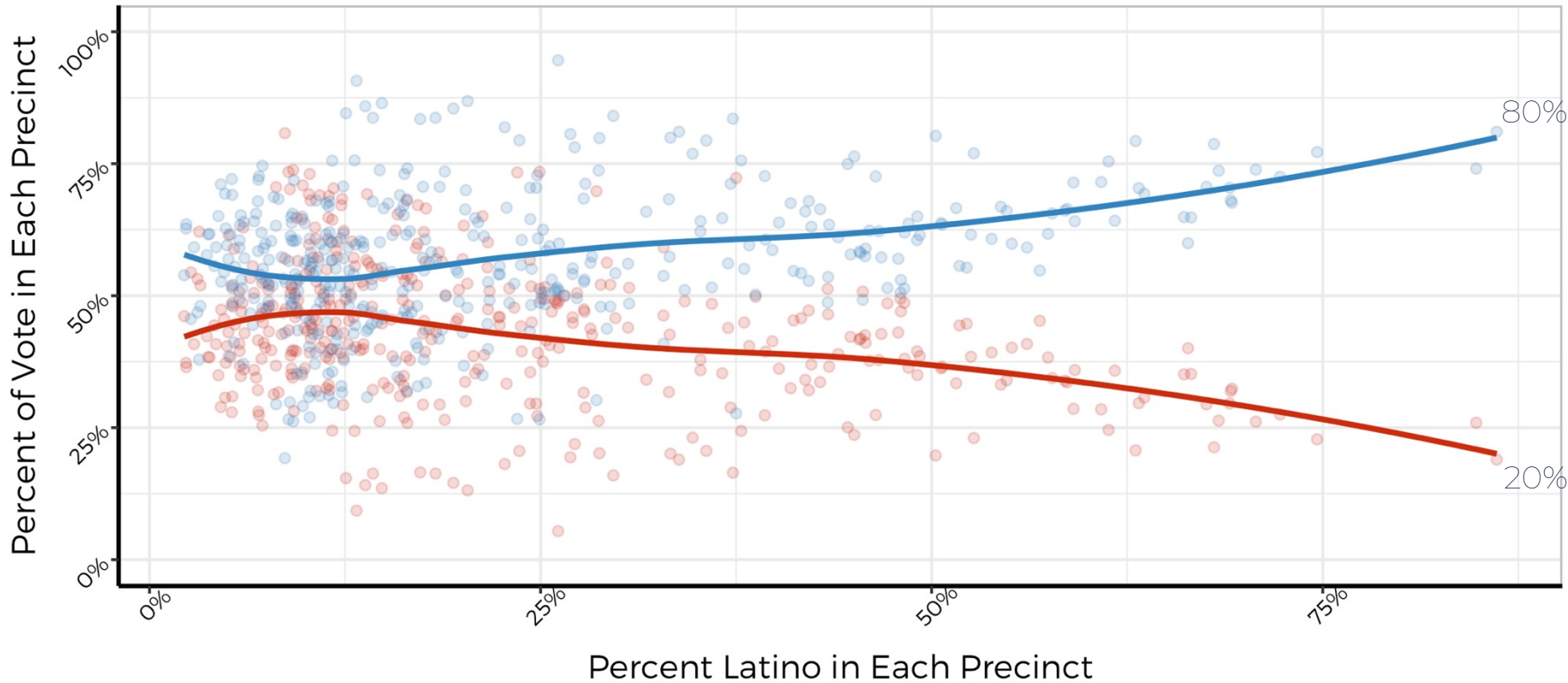

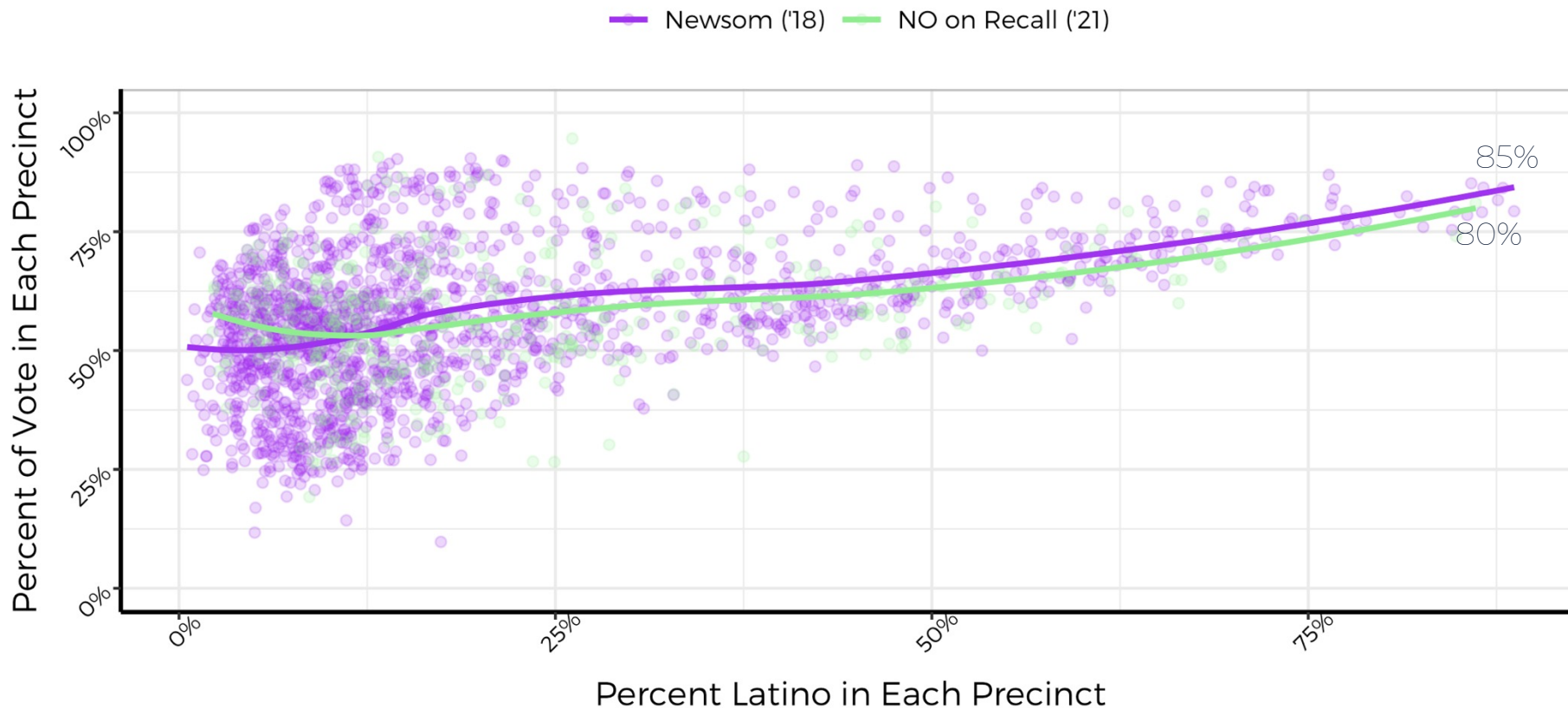

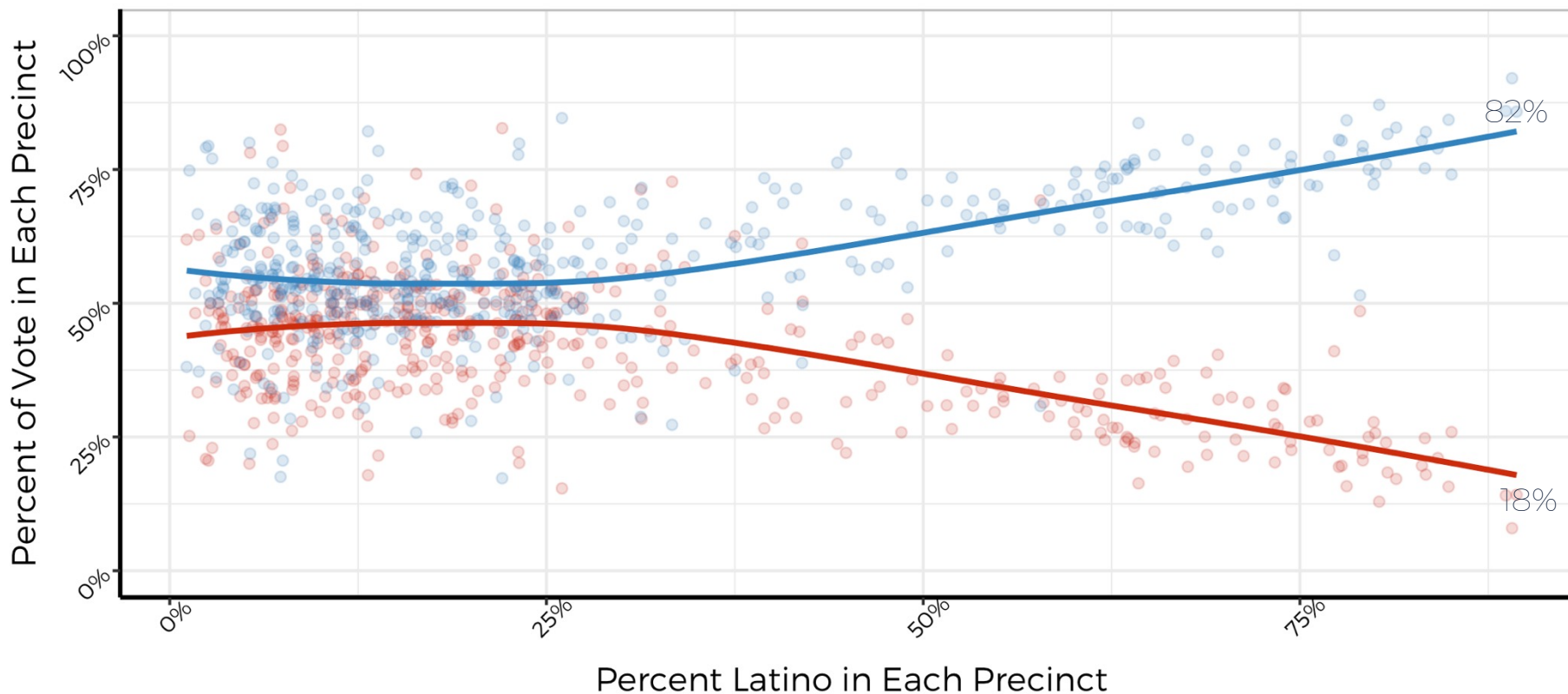
- In San Diego County’s high-density Latino precincts, 80% of voters voted “No” on the recall.

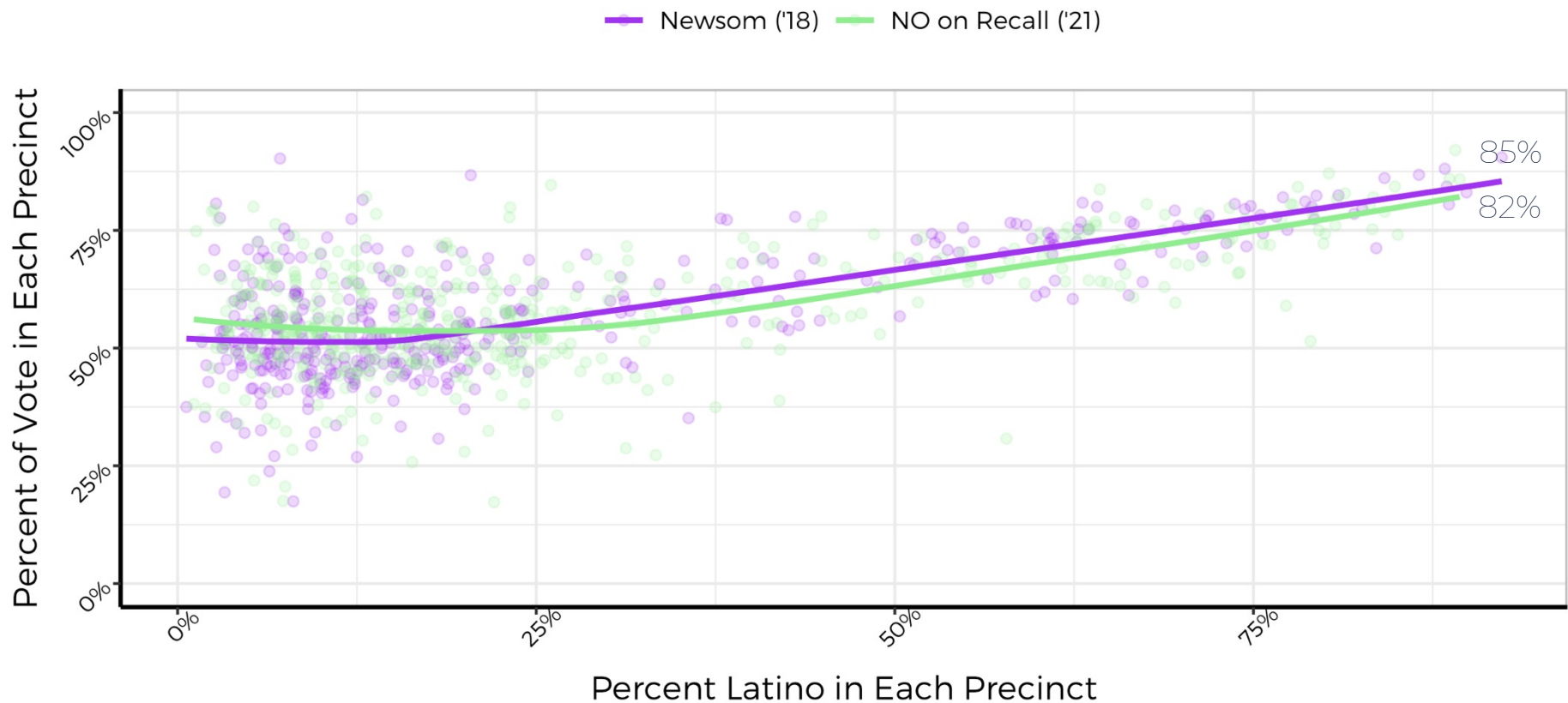

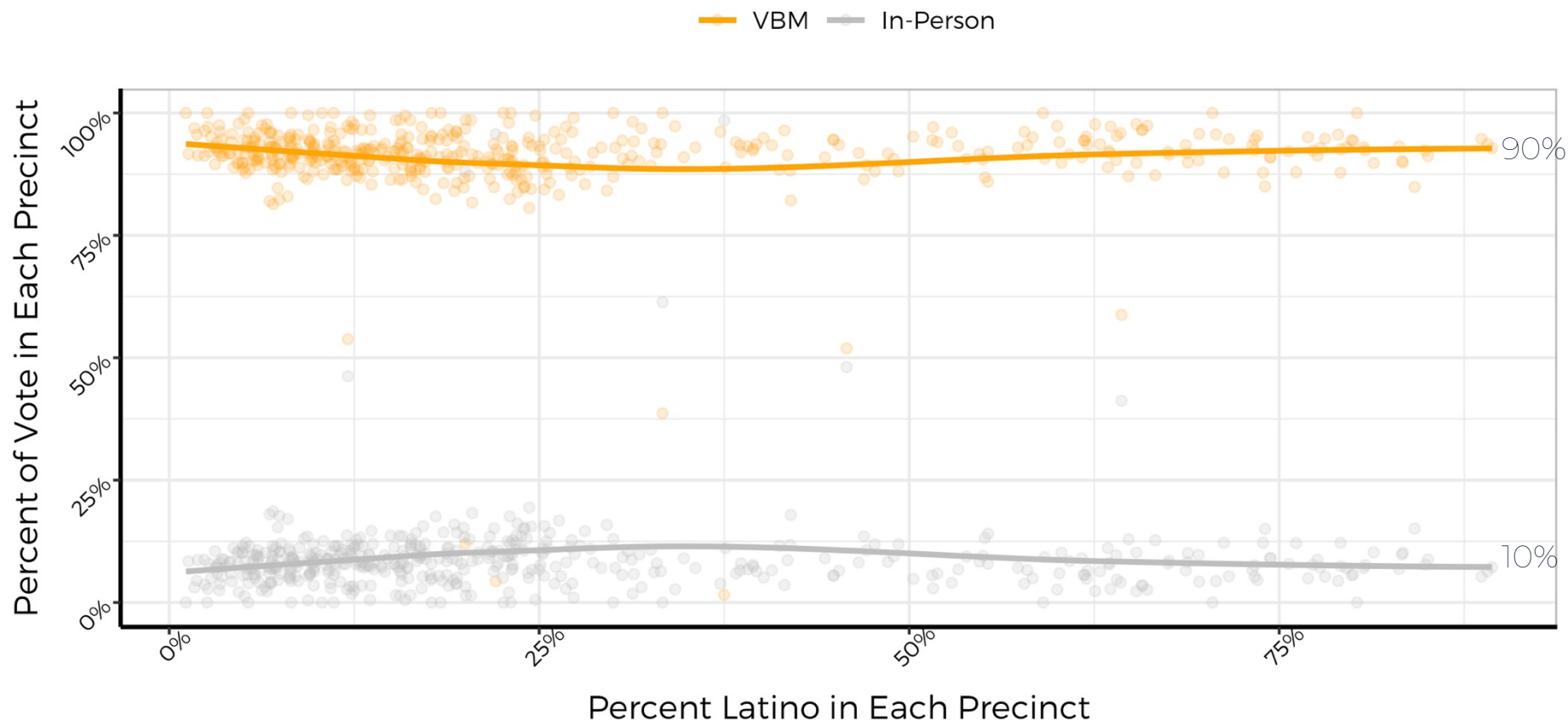

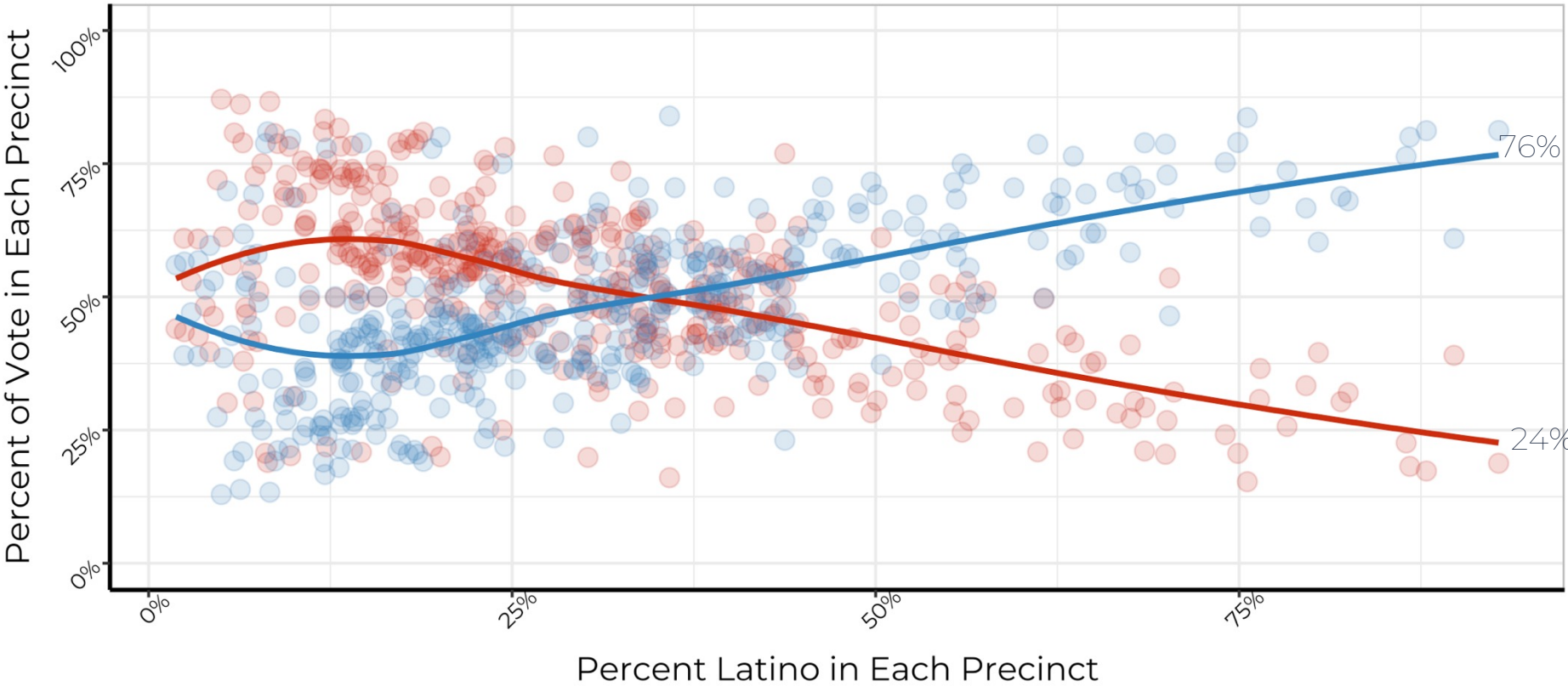

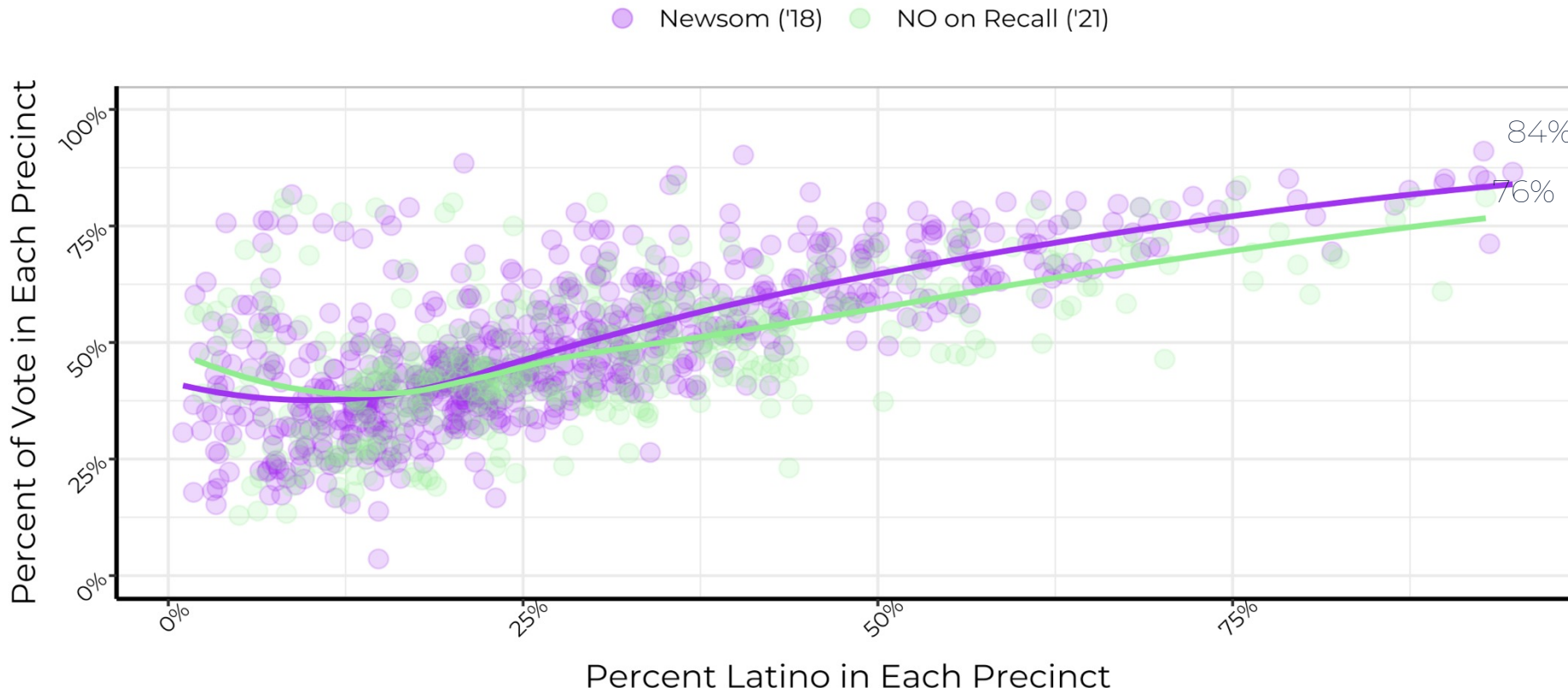

- In contrast, only 45% of non-Latino voters in Riverside County voted “No” on the recall of Governor Newsom.

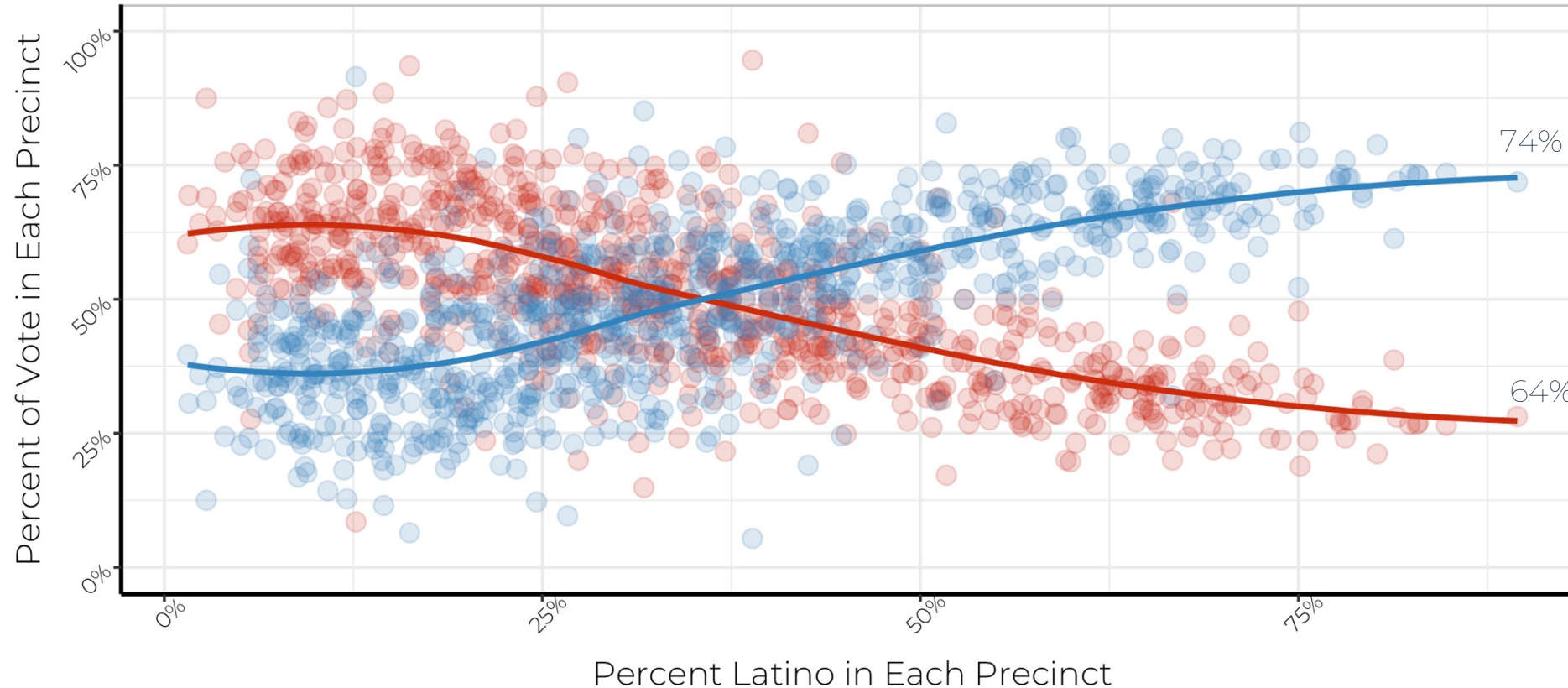

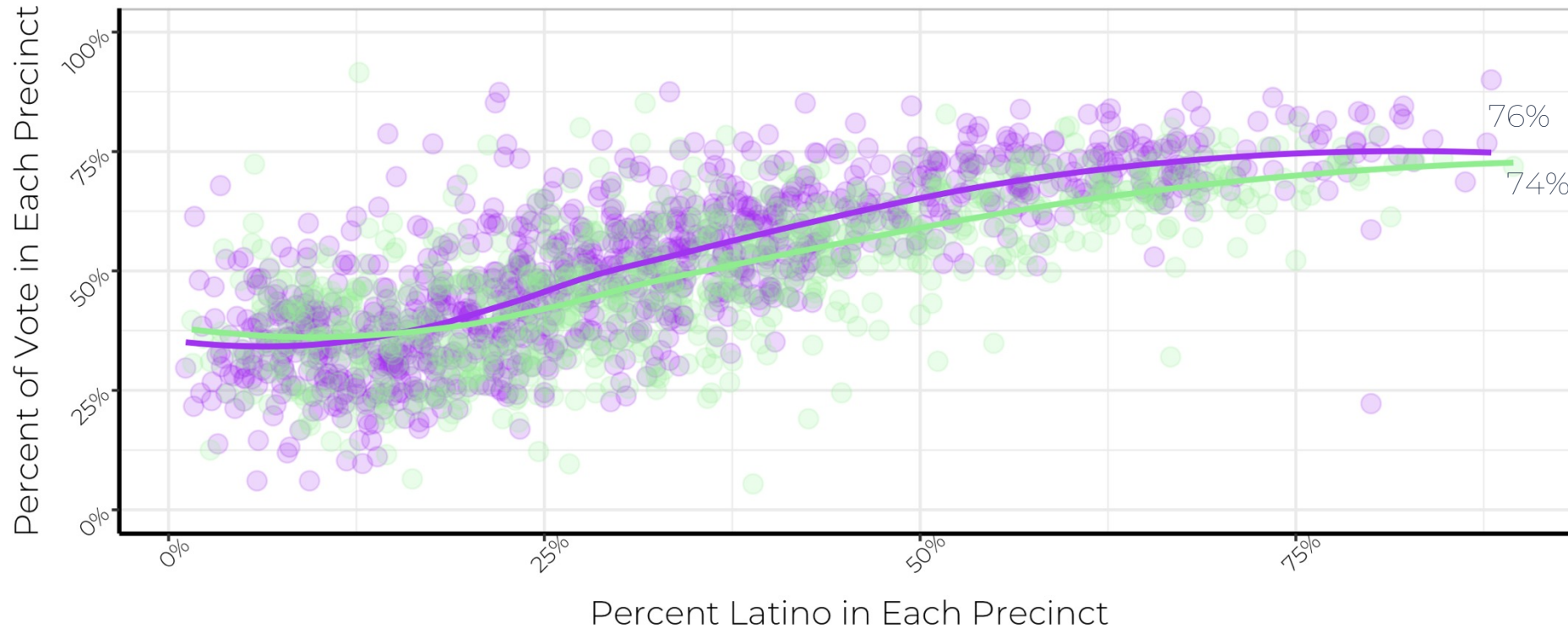

- In contrast, only 38% of non-Latino voters in San Bernardino County voted “No” on the recall of Governor Newsom.
- Overall, 50.2% of San Bernardino County voted “No” on the recall.

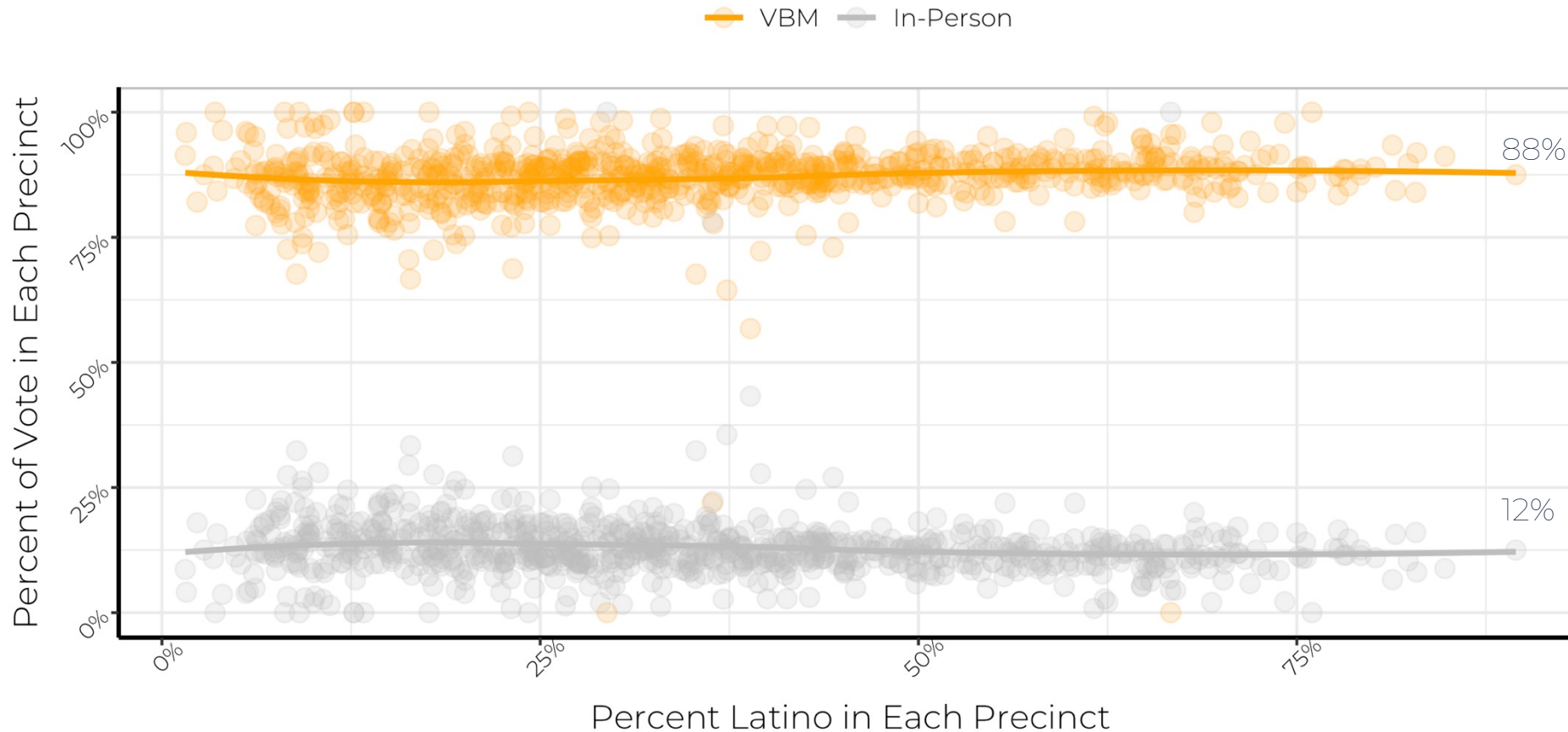

- In high-density Latino precincts, 74% of voters rejected the recall.

- In high-density Latino precincts, support for Governor Newsom fell by an estimated 2 percentage points between 2018 and 2021, but remained around 75%.

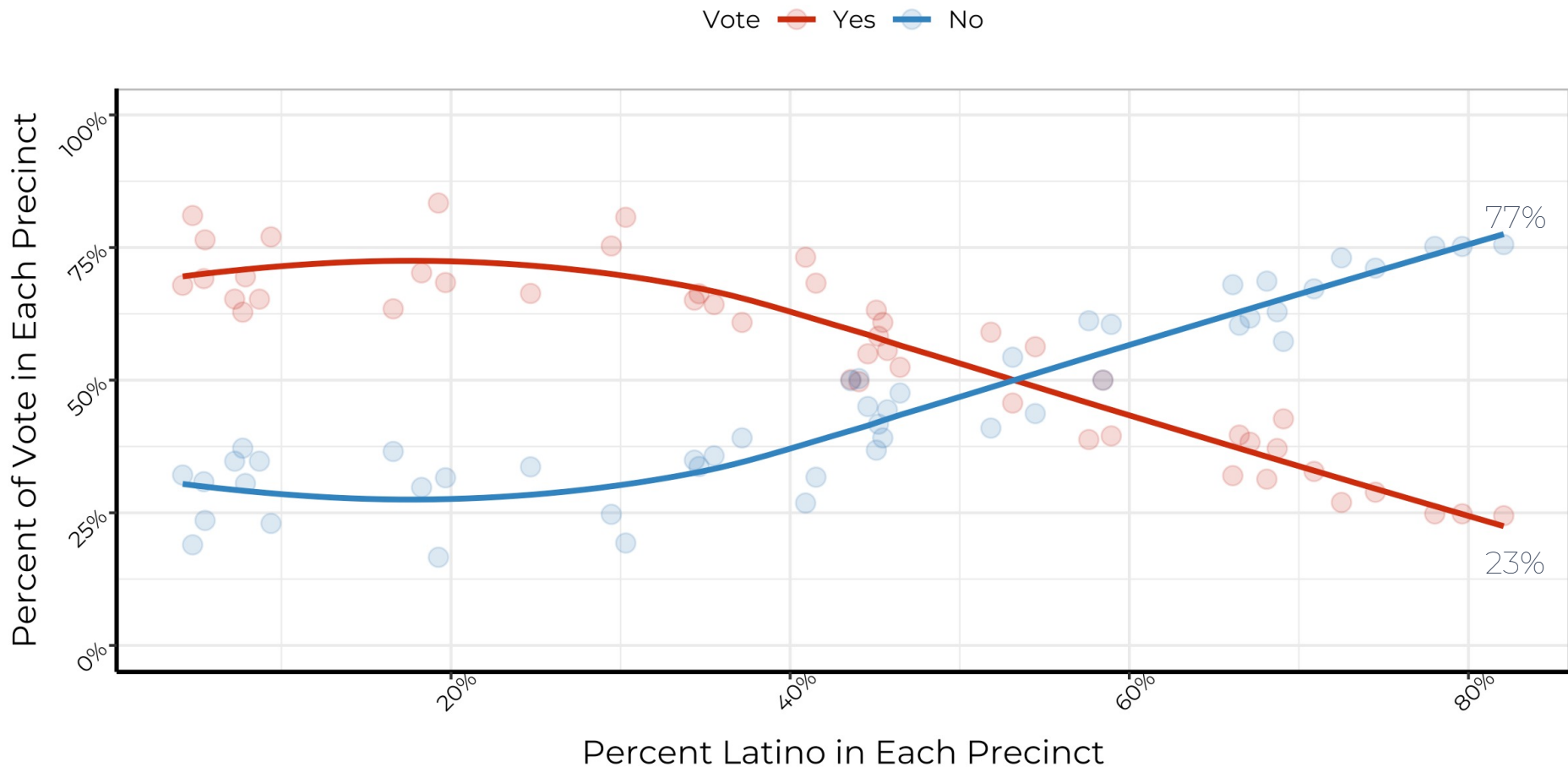
- Overall, 86.6% of voters in San Bernardino County voted by mail during the recall.

Sorted by Percent Latino within each Precinct

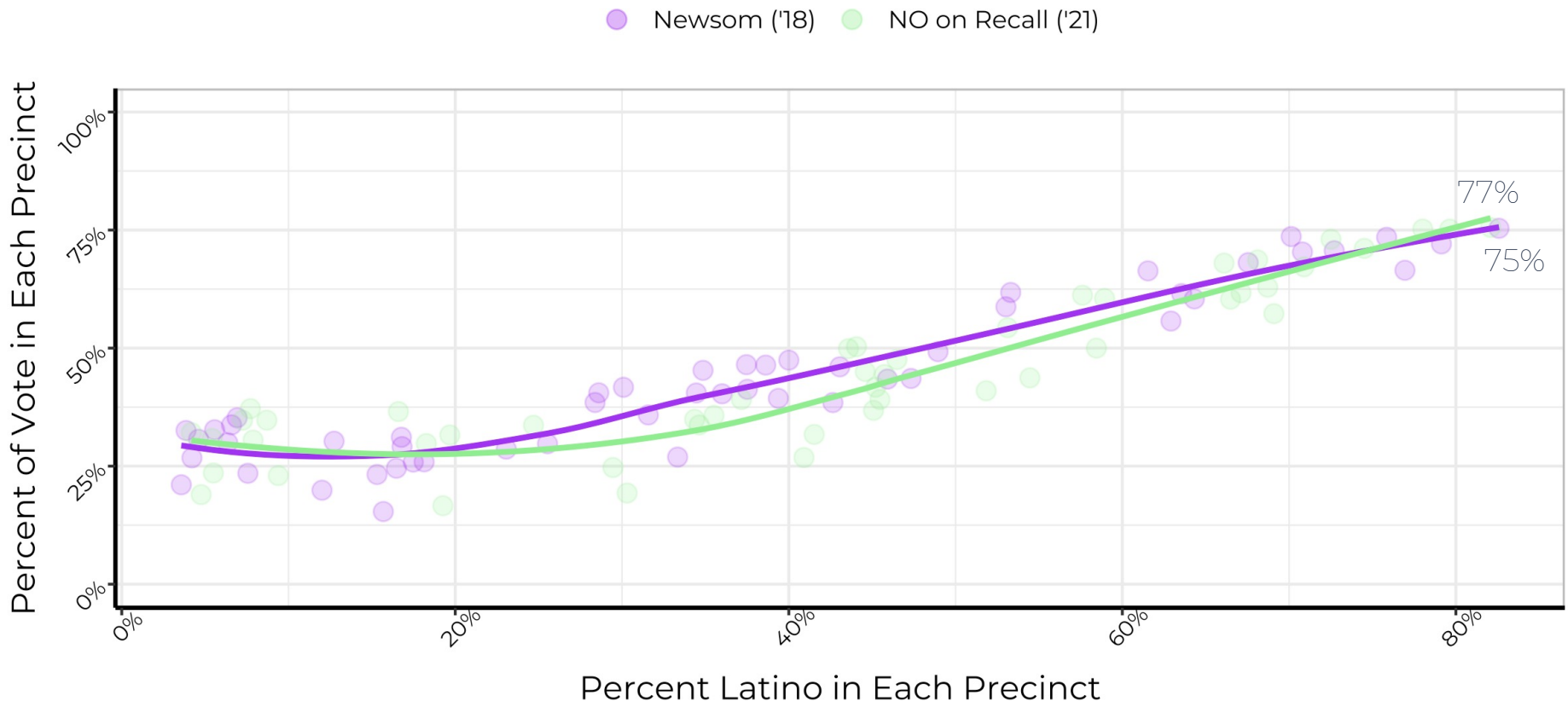

- Central California counties reveal clear differences in voting patterns by race/ethnicity.

- In stark contrast, only 30% of non-Latino voters in Madera County voted “No” on the recall.
- Overall, 61.2% of Madera County voted “Yes” on the recall.

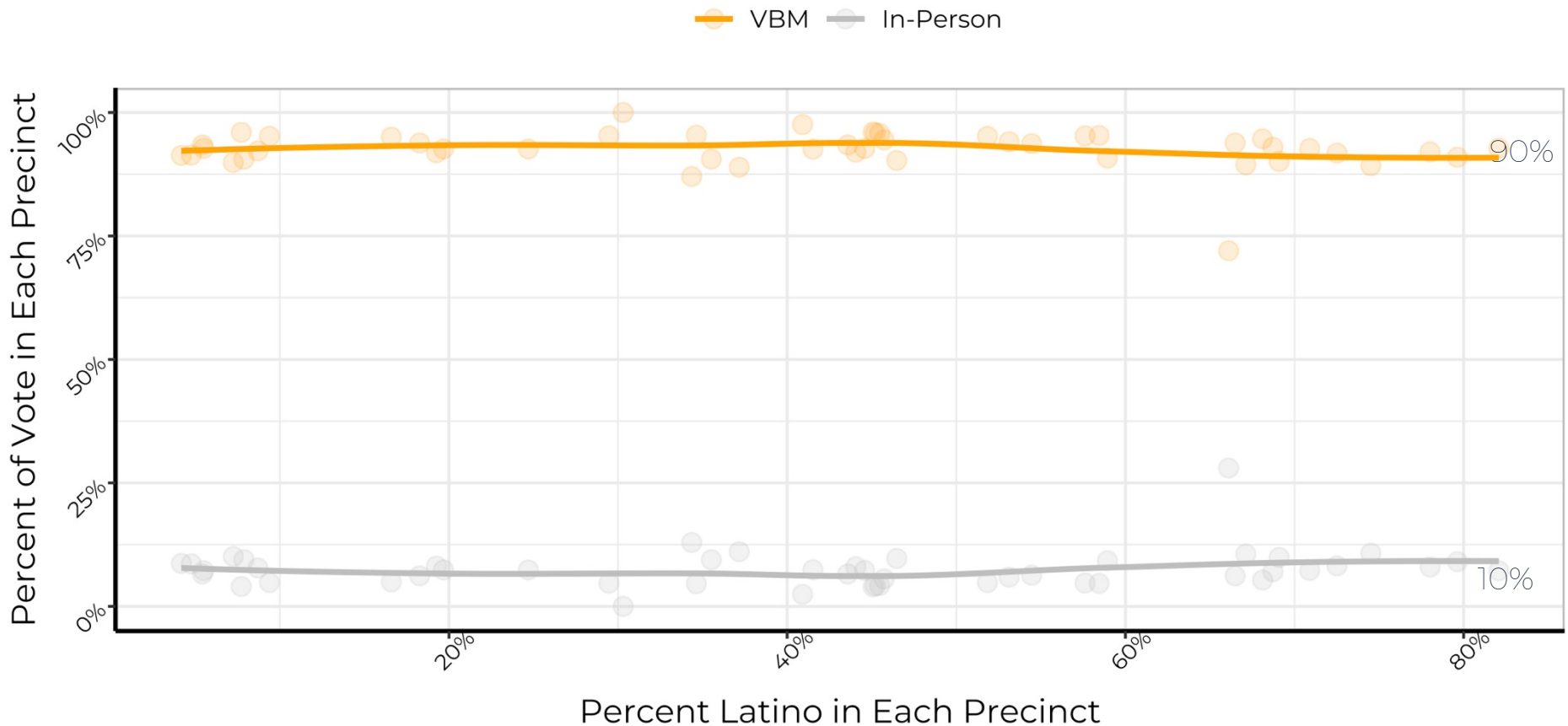


- In Madera County’s High-density Latino precincts, 77% of voters were against the recall.

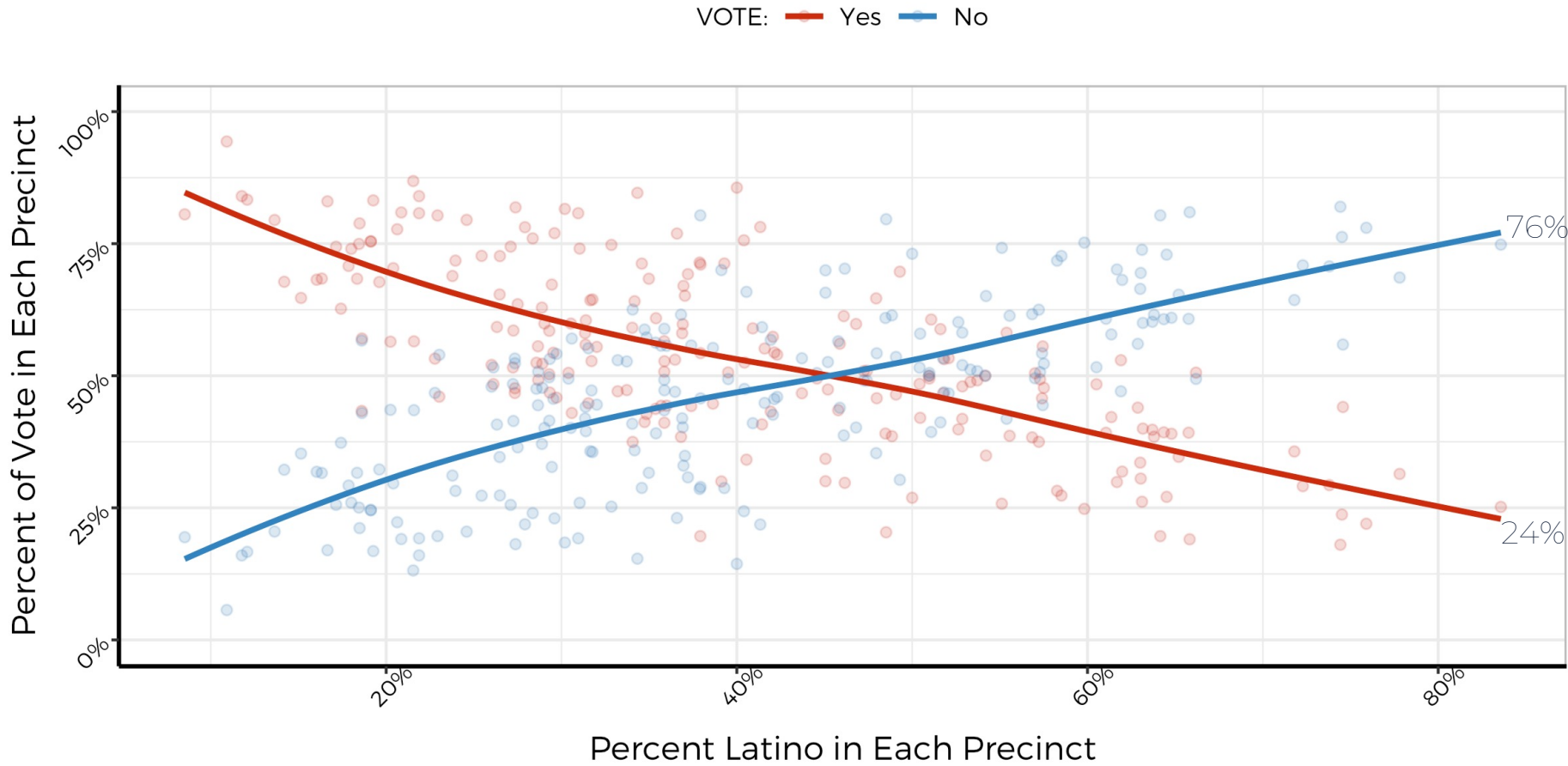

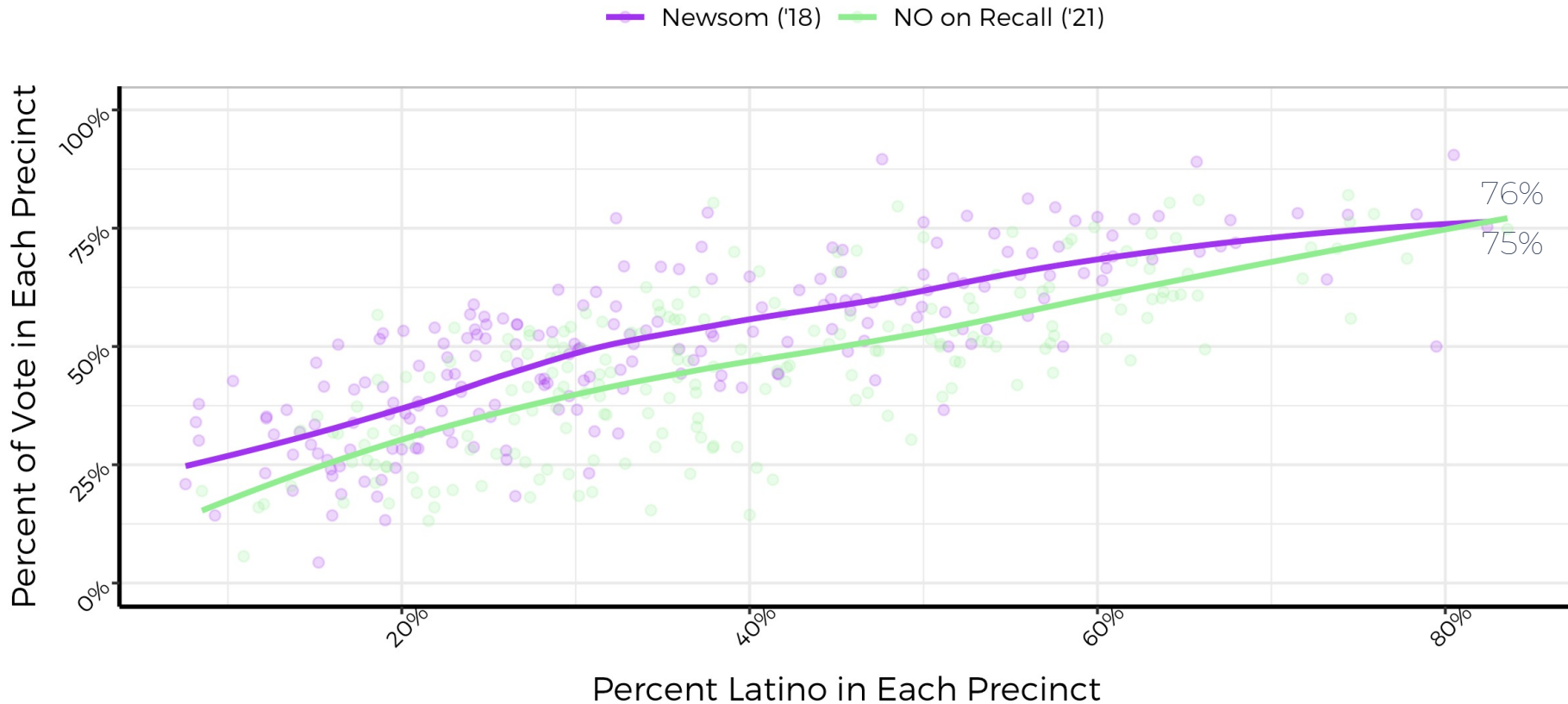

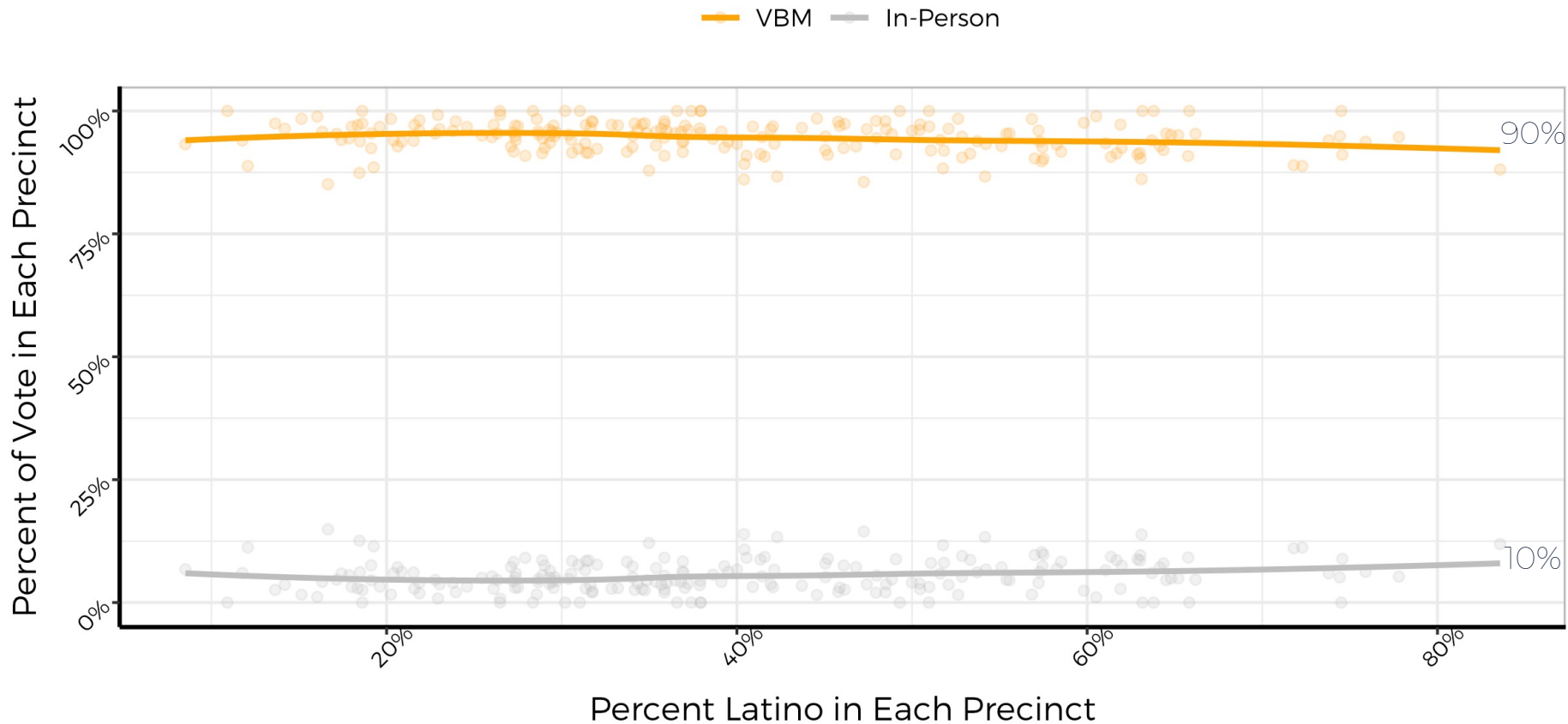

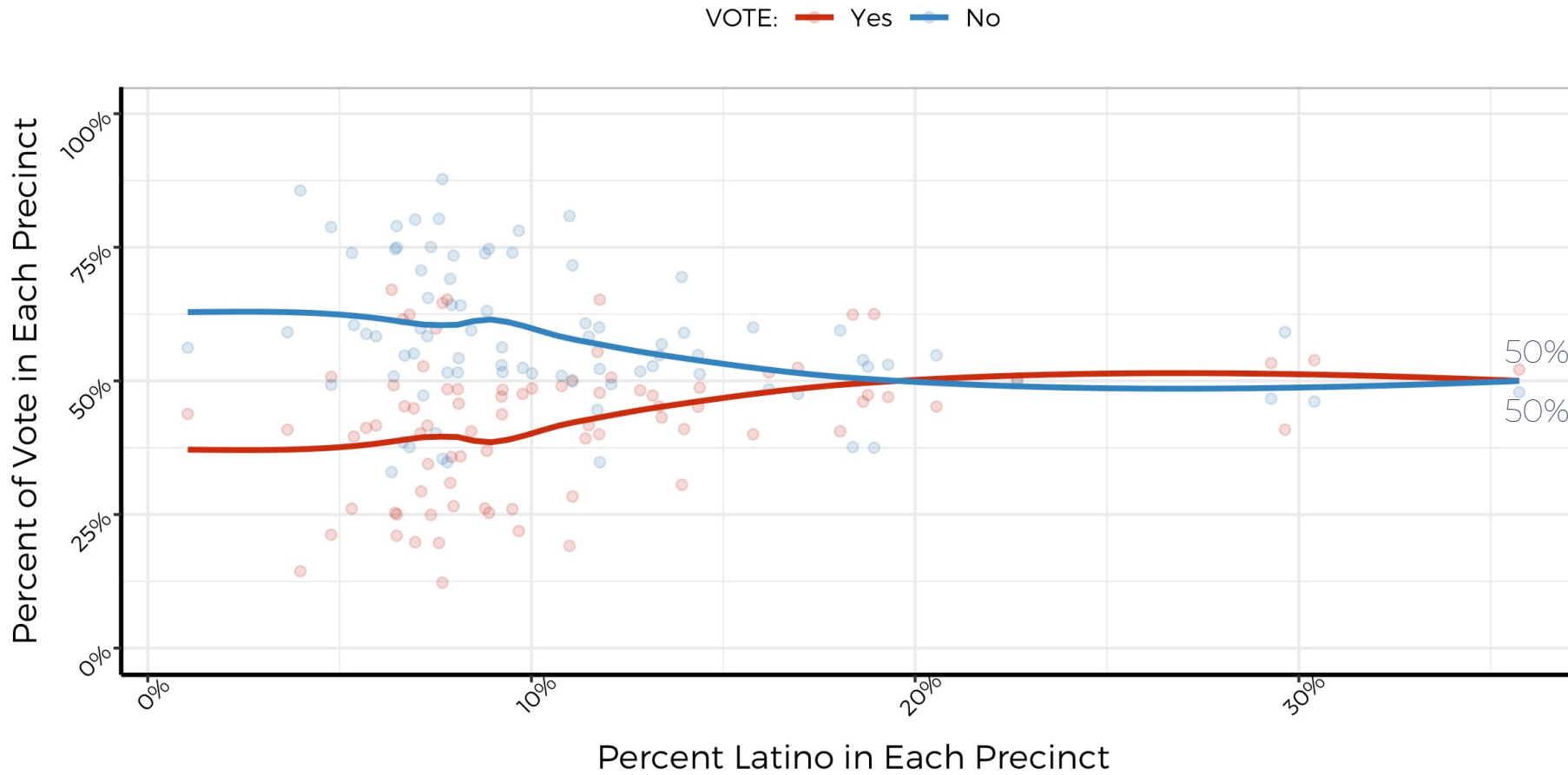
Percent of Votes Cast by Mail (VBM) or in Person

Sorted by Percent Latino within each Precinct

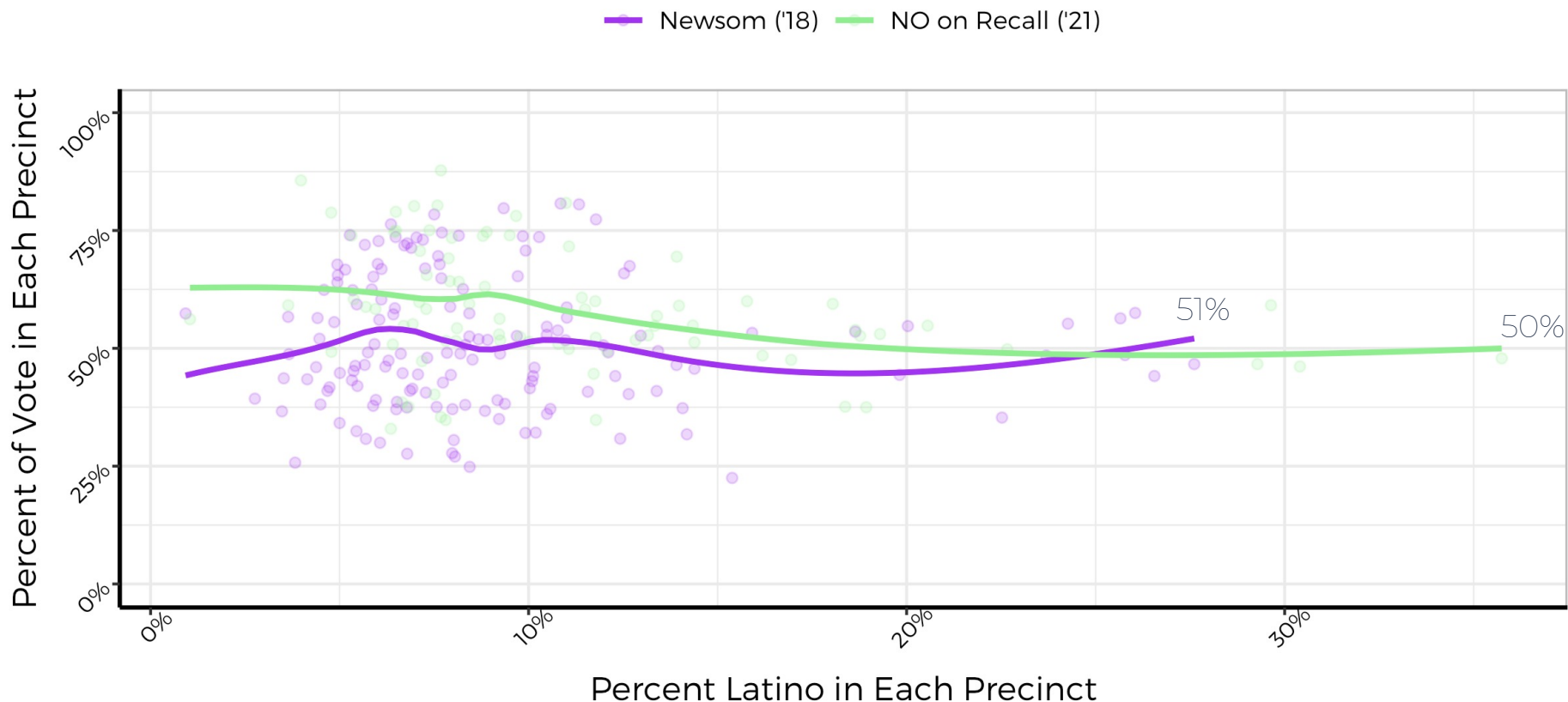

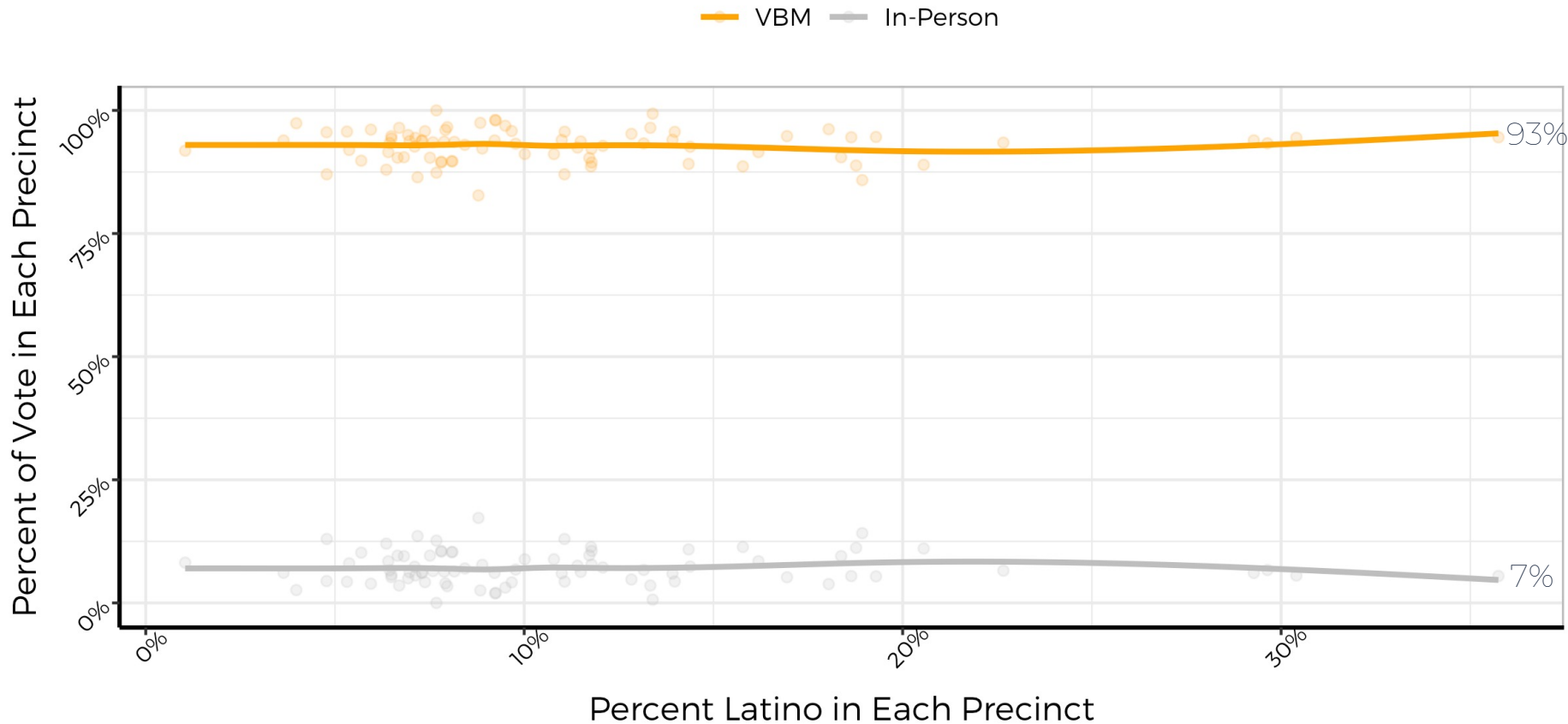

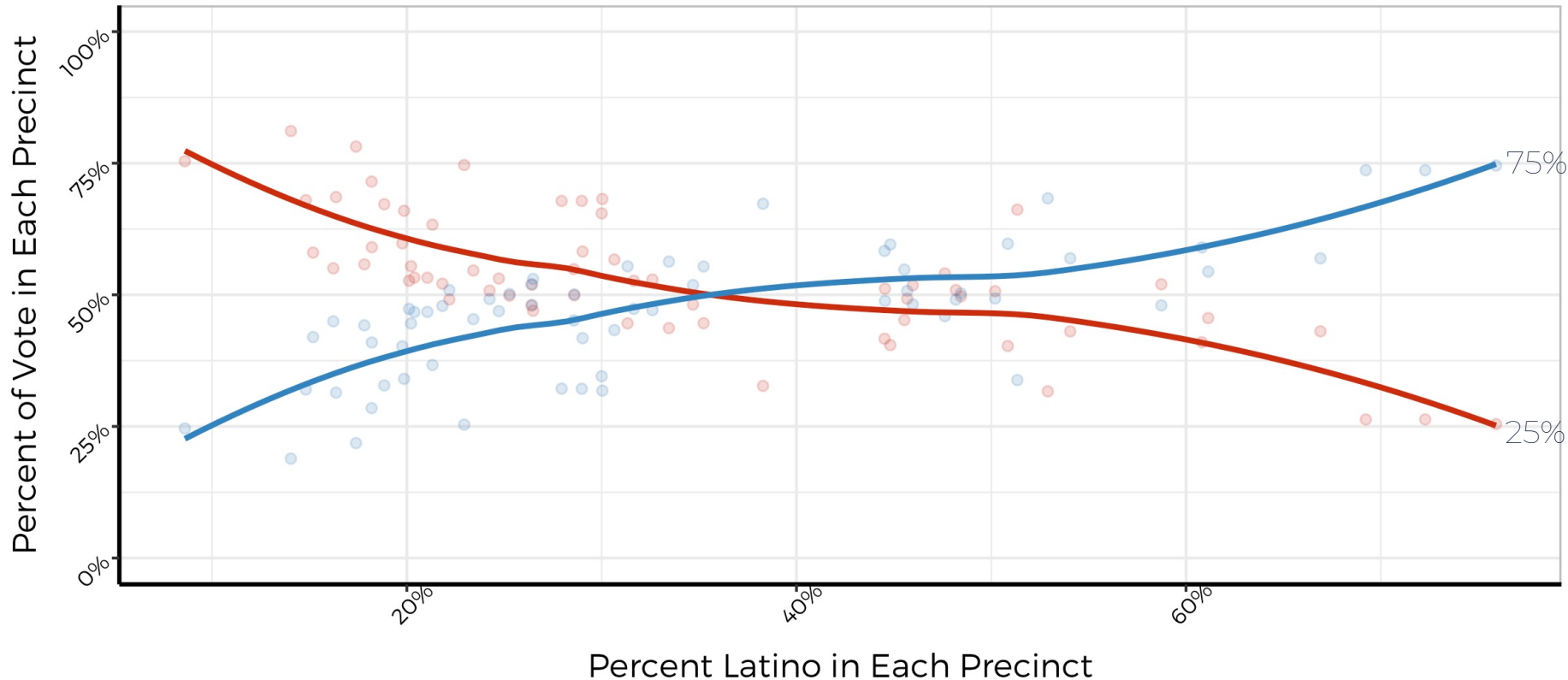

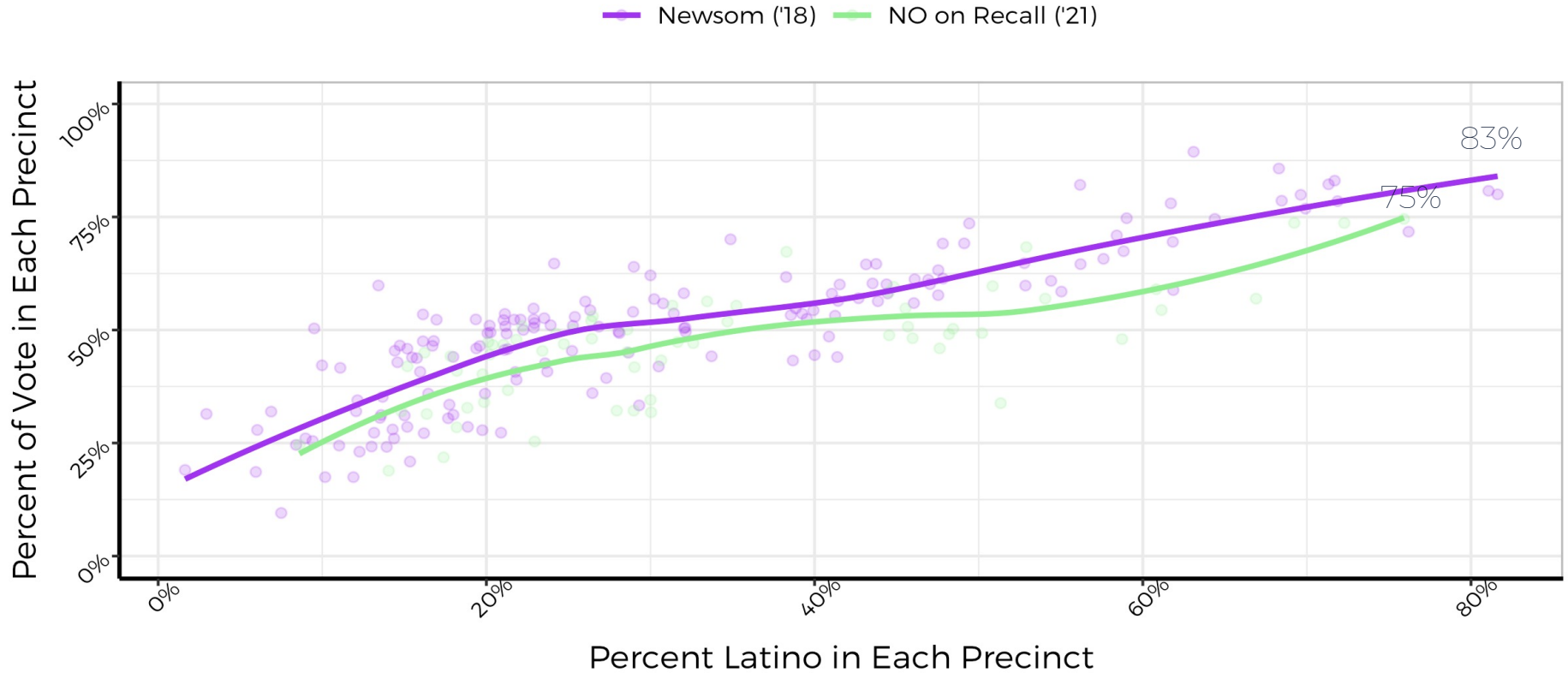

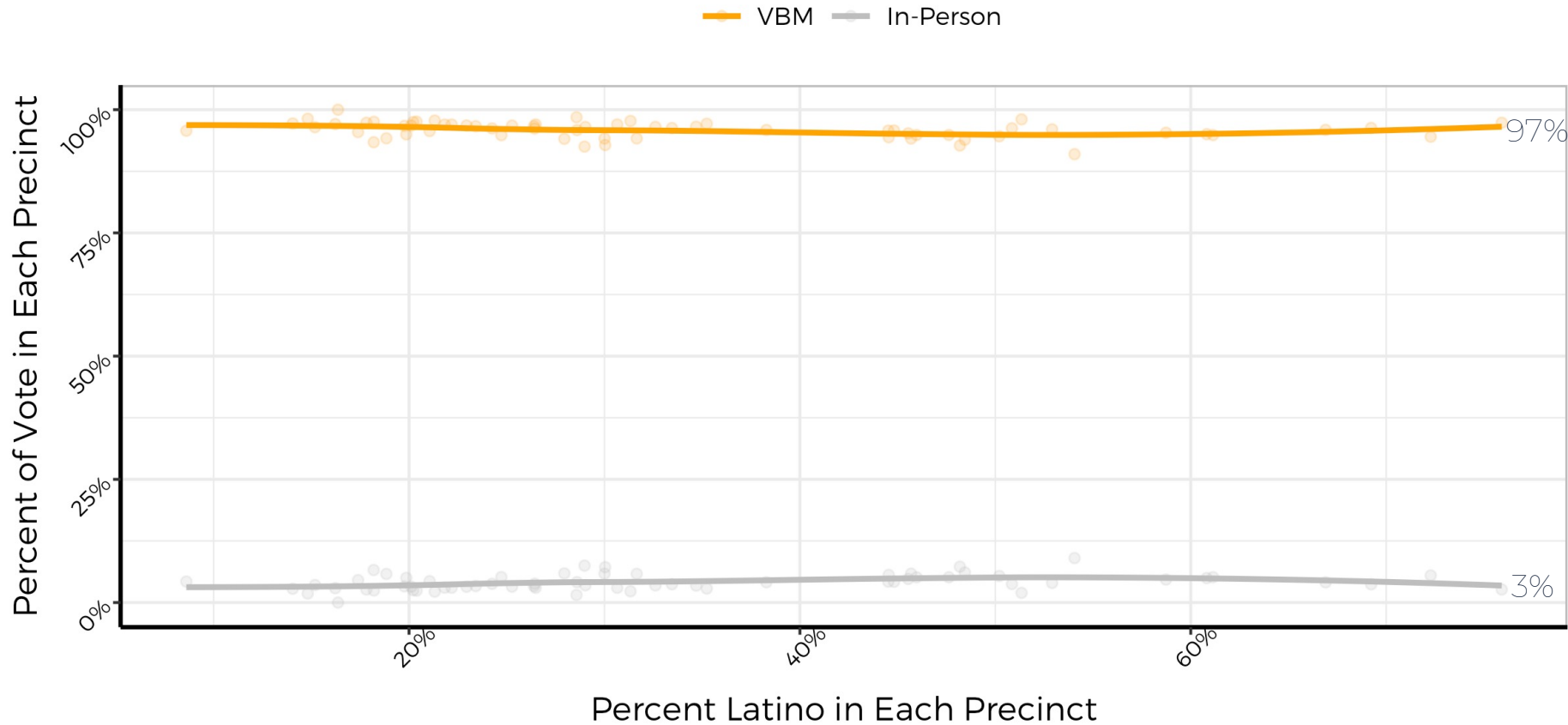

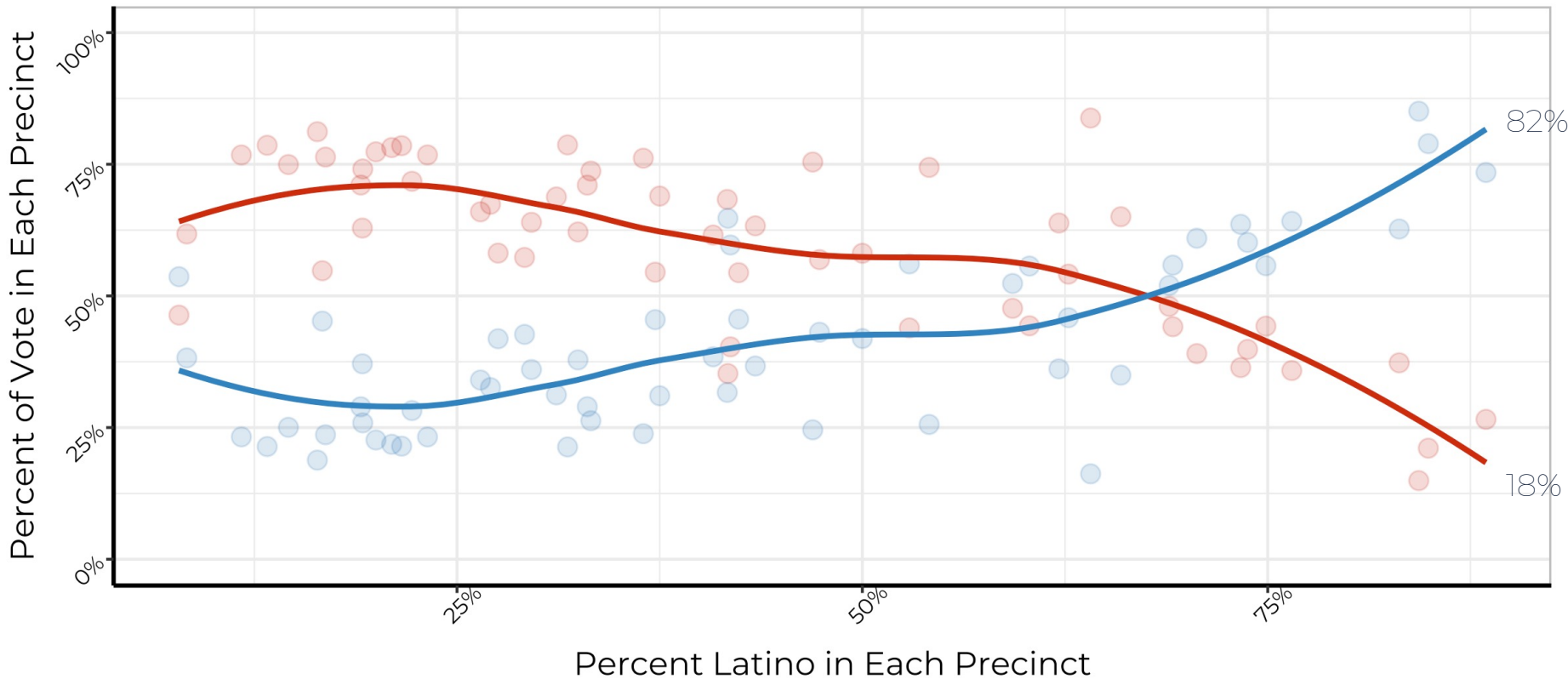

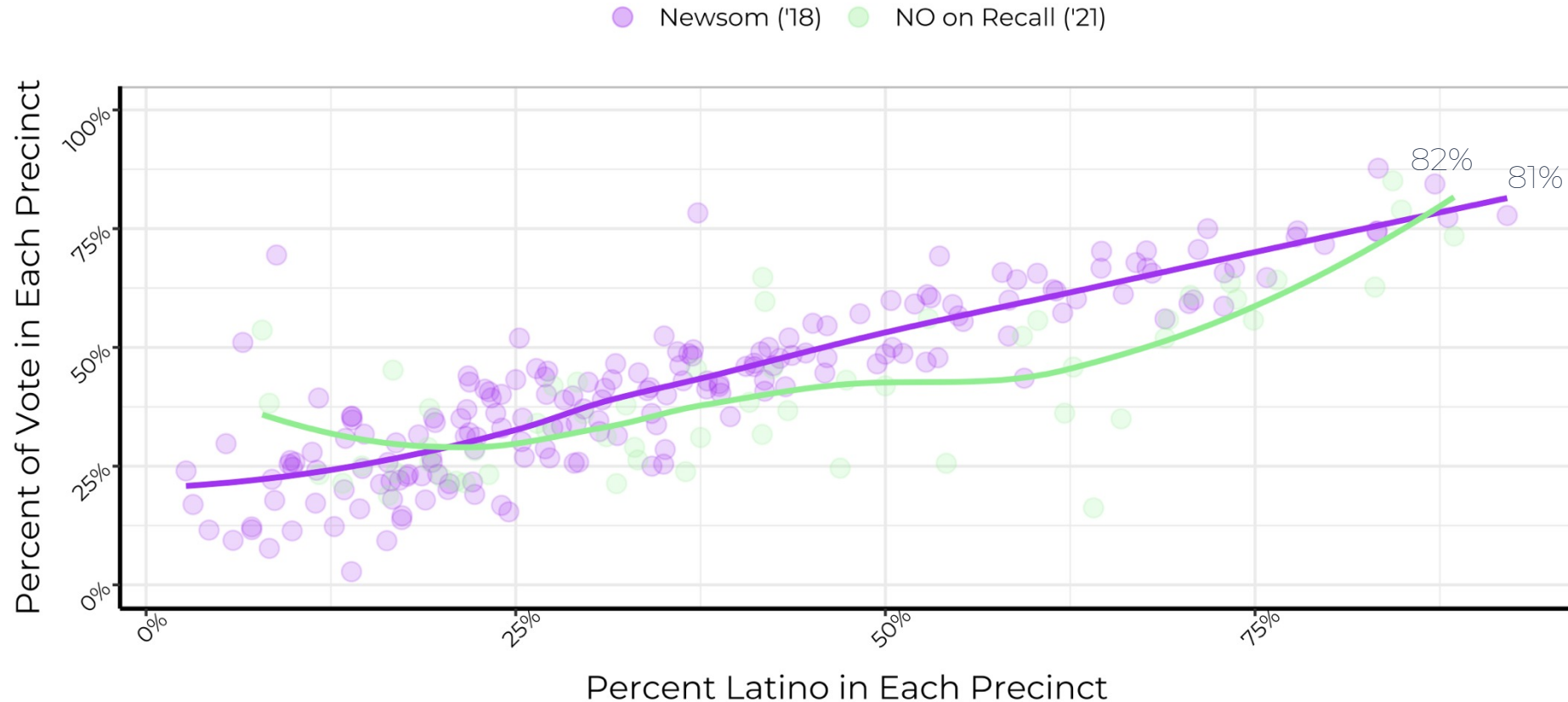

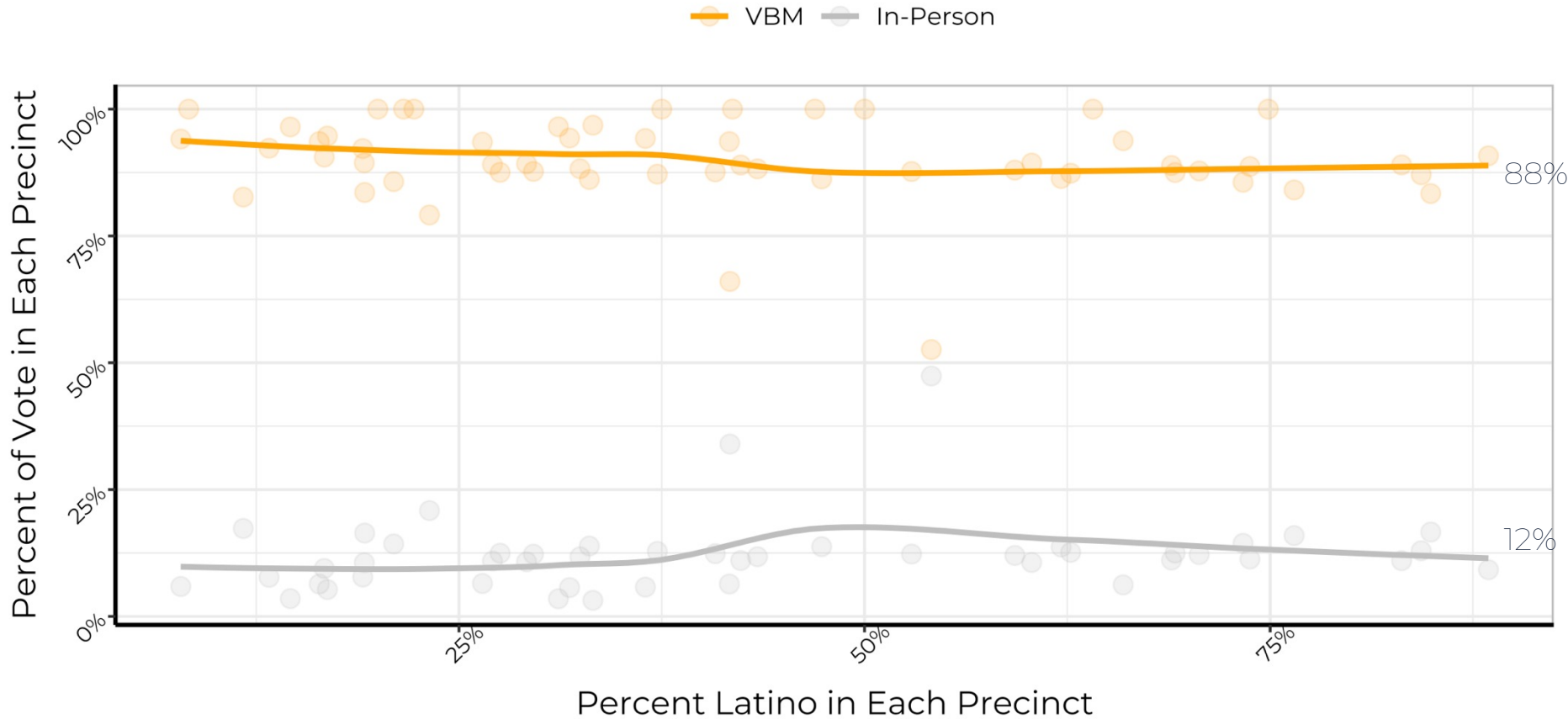


- In Tulare County’s high-density Latino precincts, 82% of Latinos voted “No” on the recall of Governor Newsom.

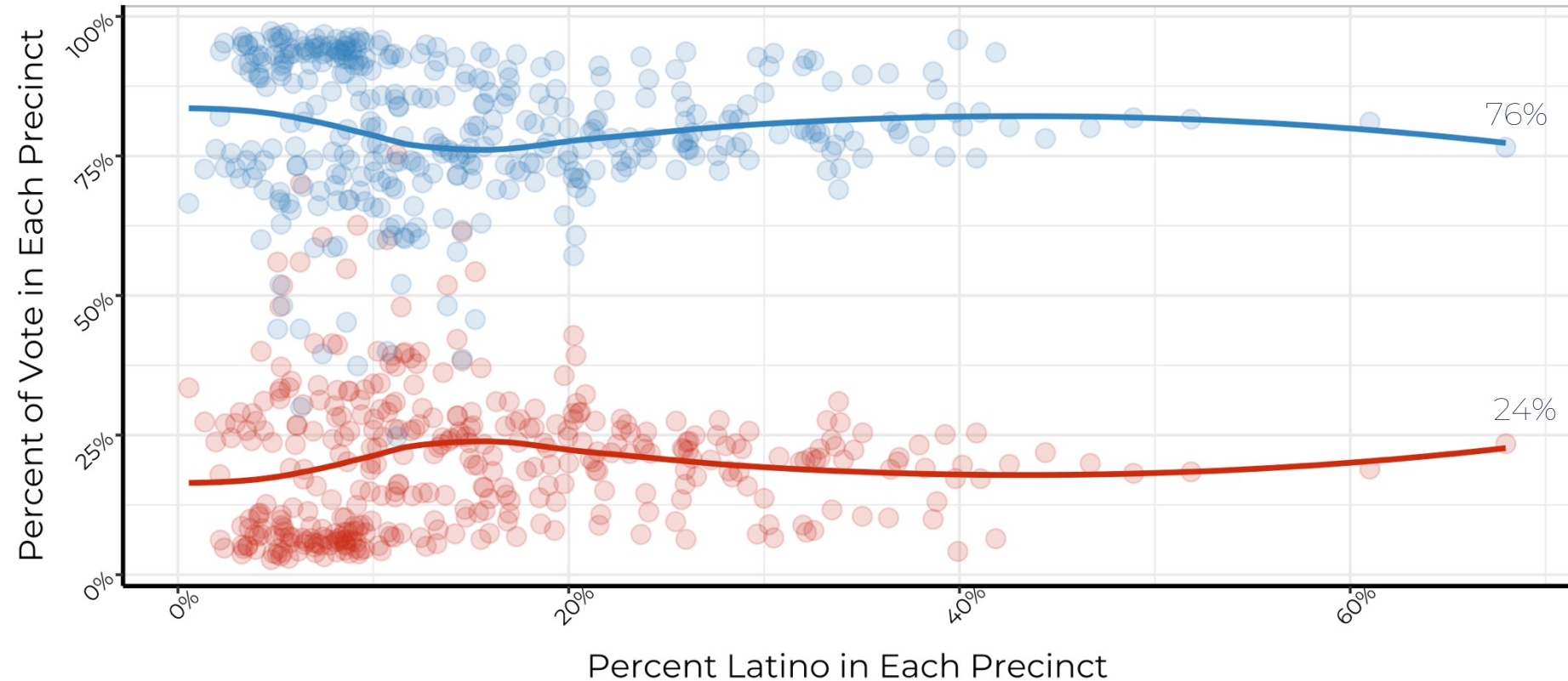
- Overall, 88.8% of voters in Tulare County voted by mail during the recall.

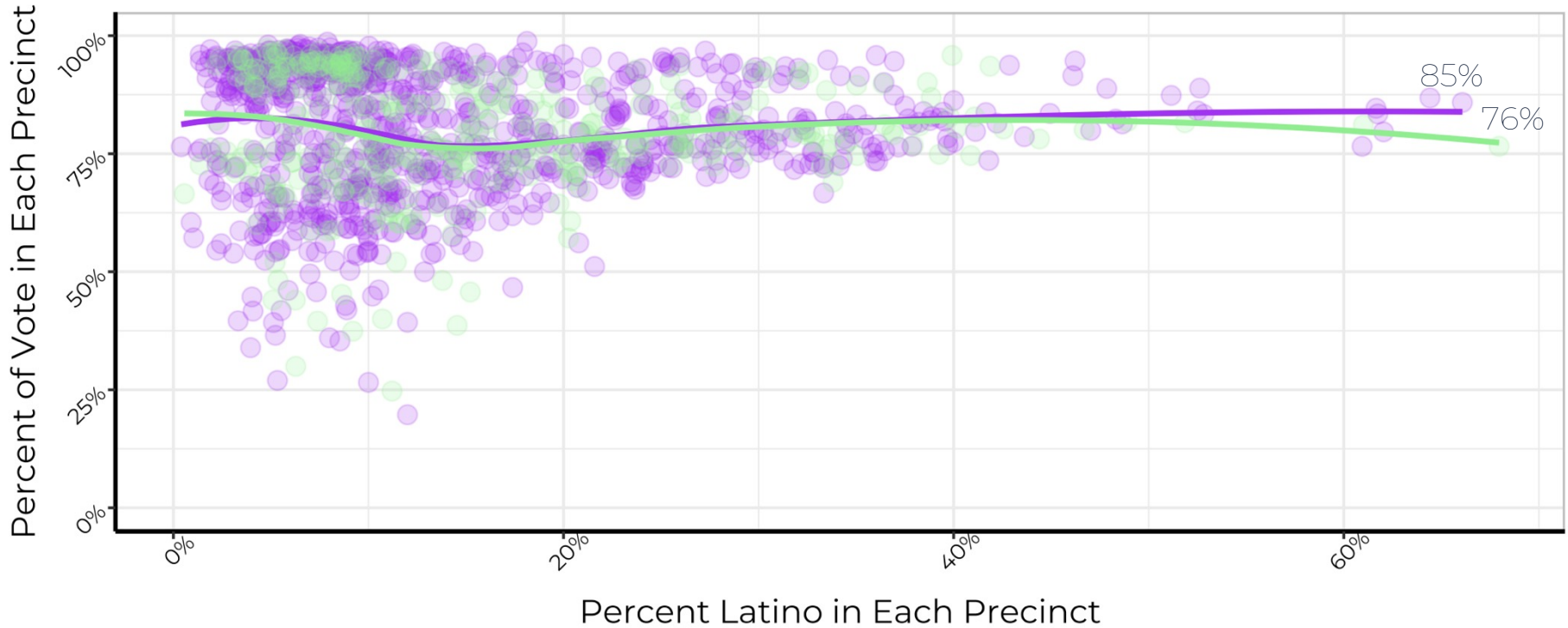

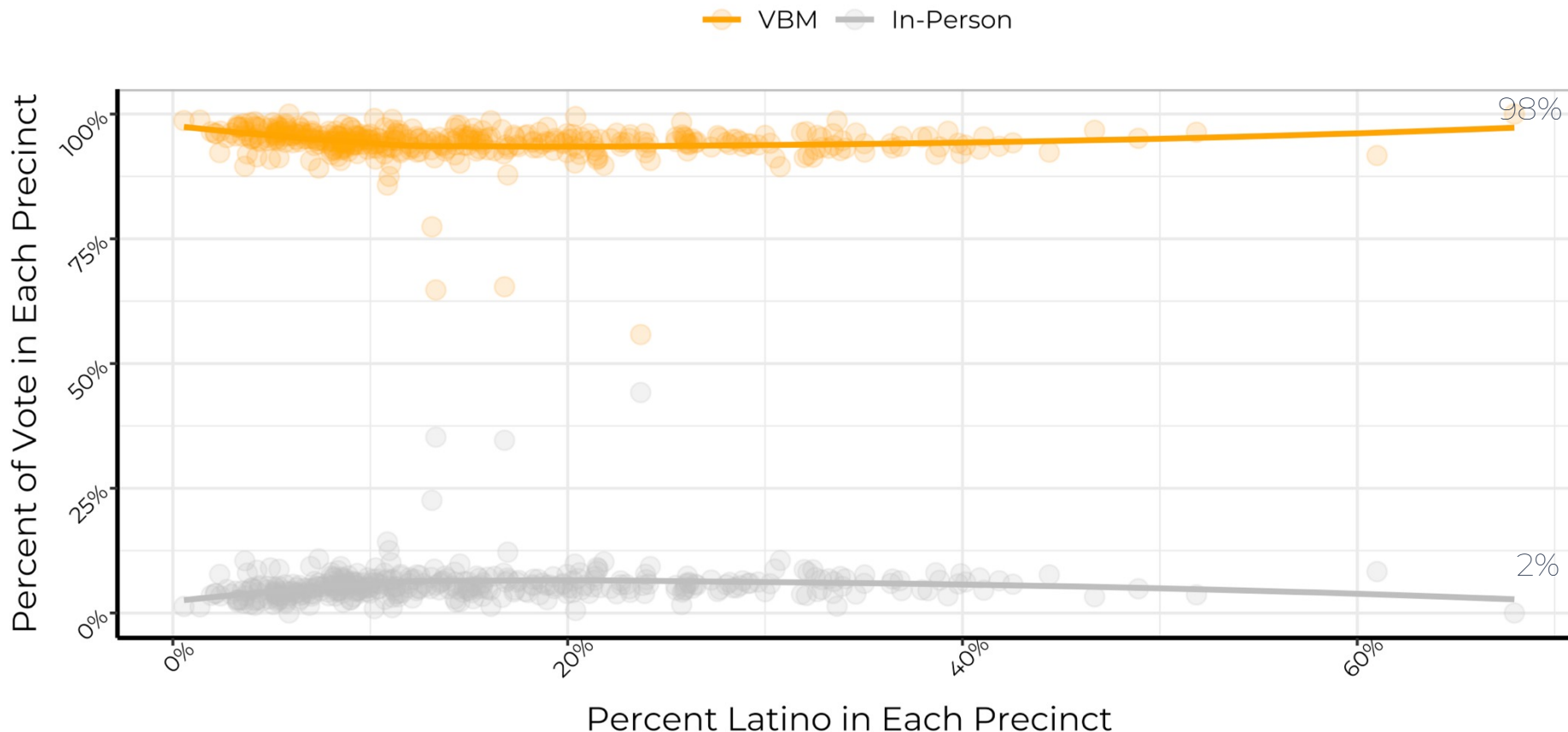

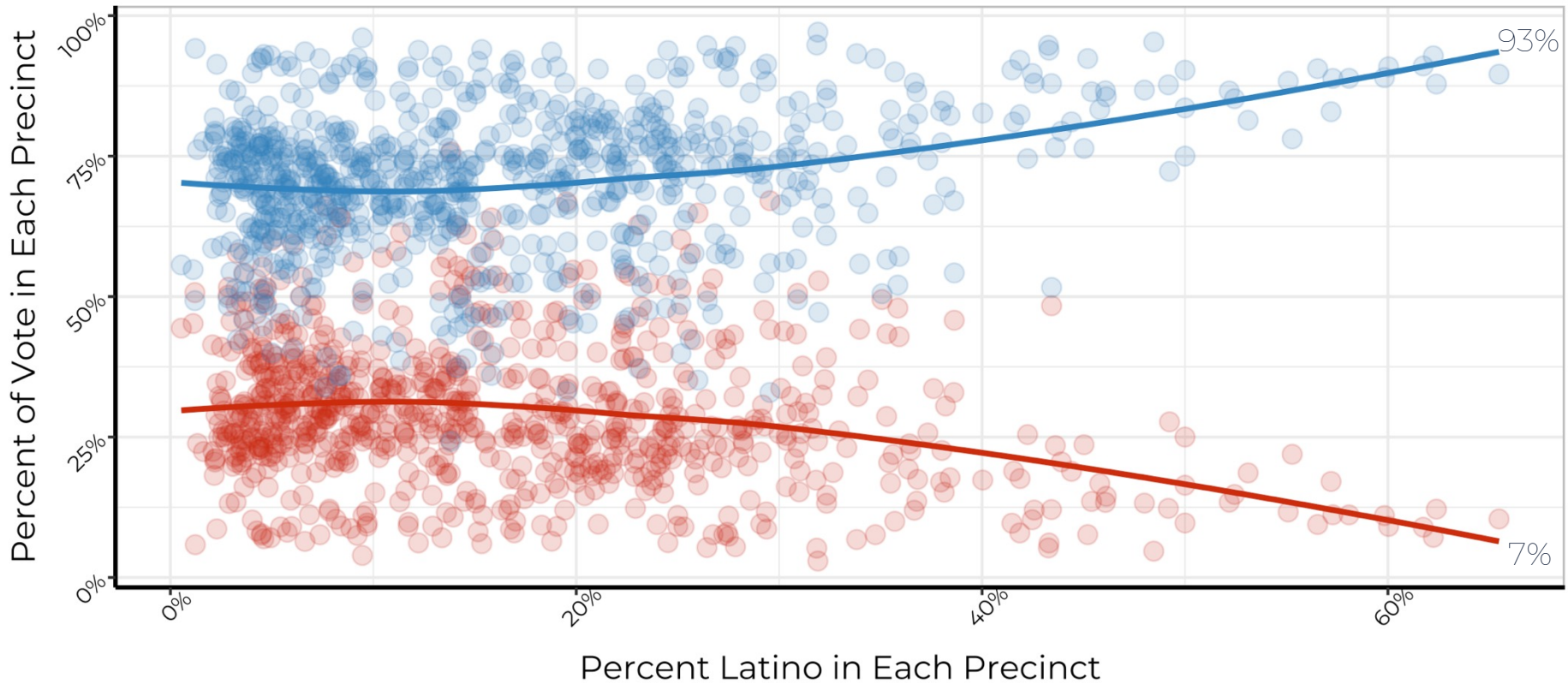

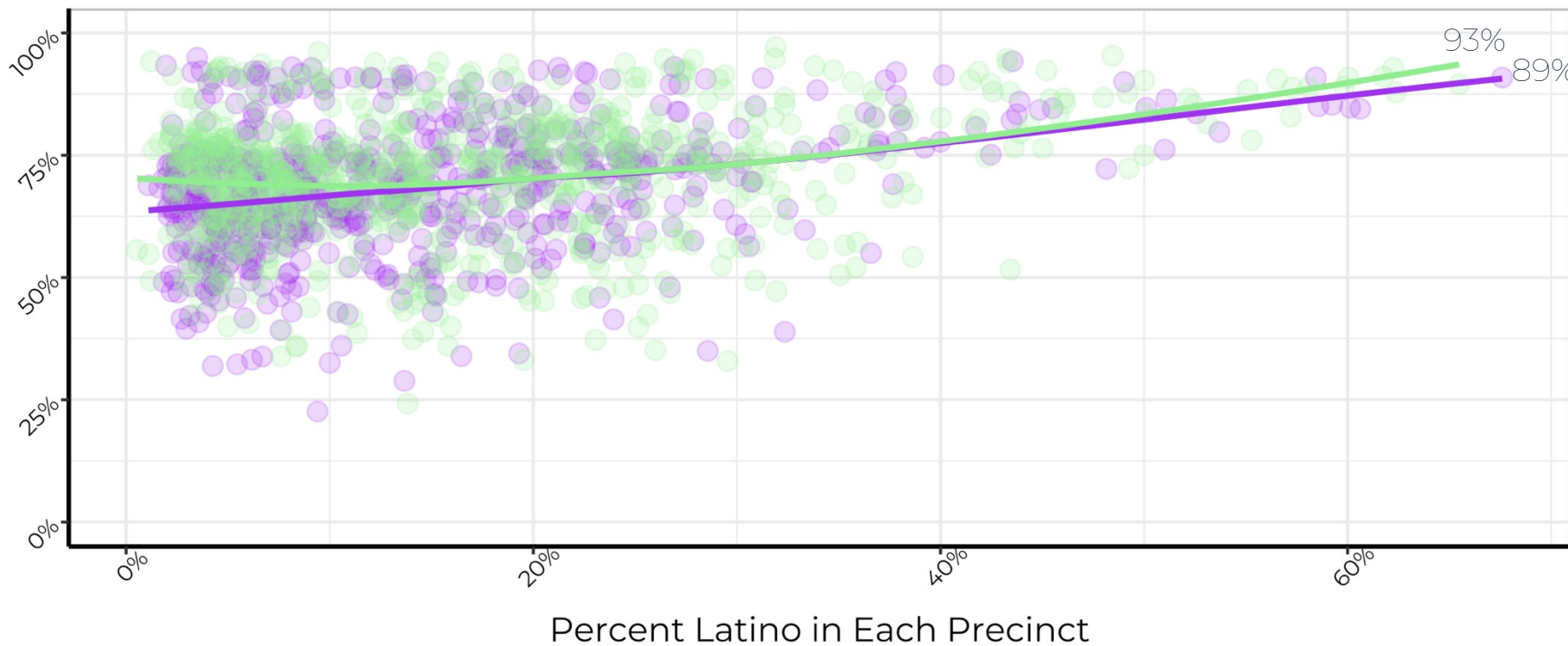
- Contra Costa shows one of the highest rates of “No” votes by Latinos.

Percent of Vote in Each Precinct



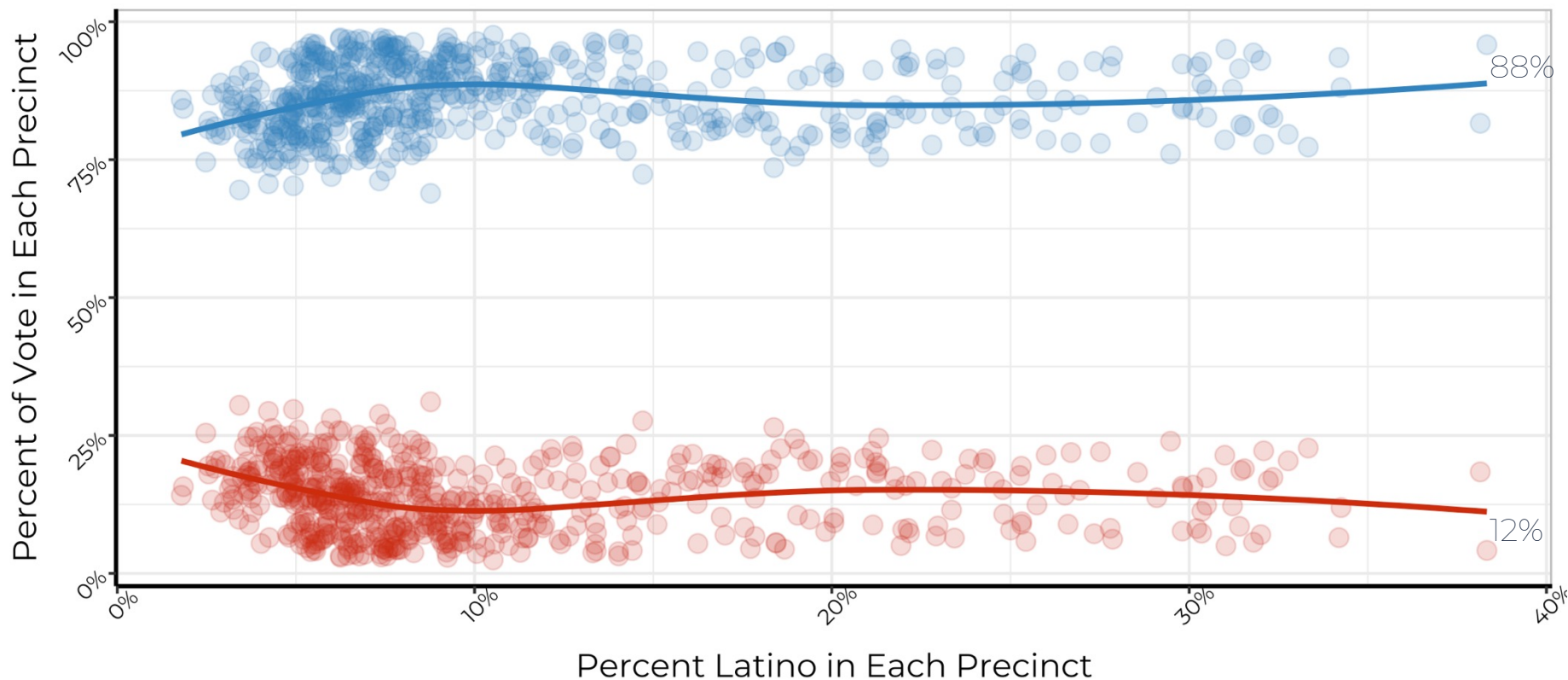

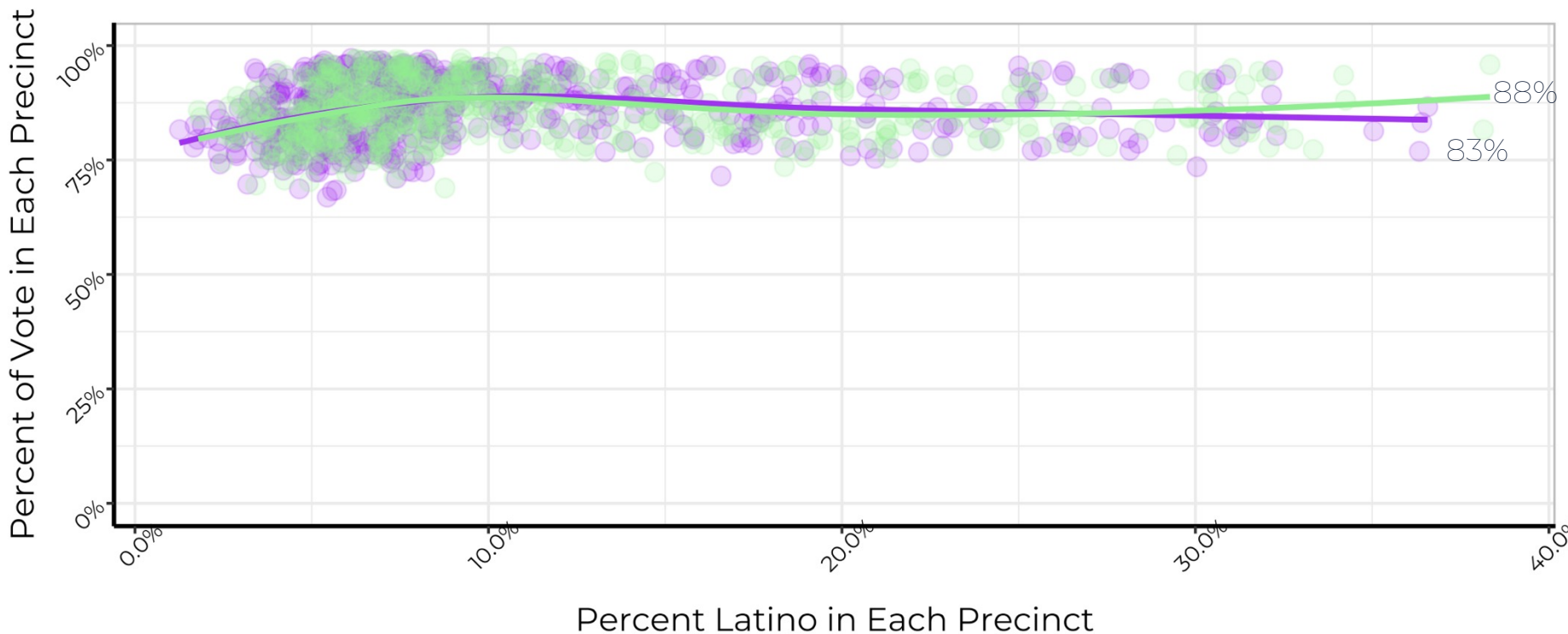

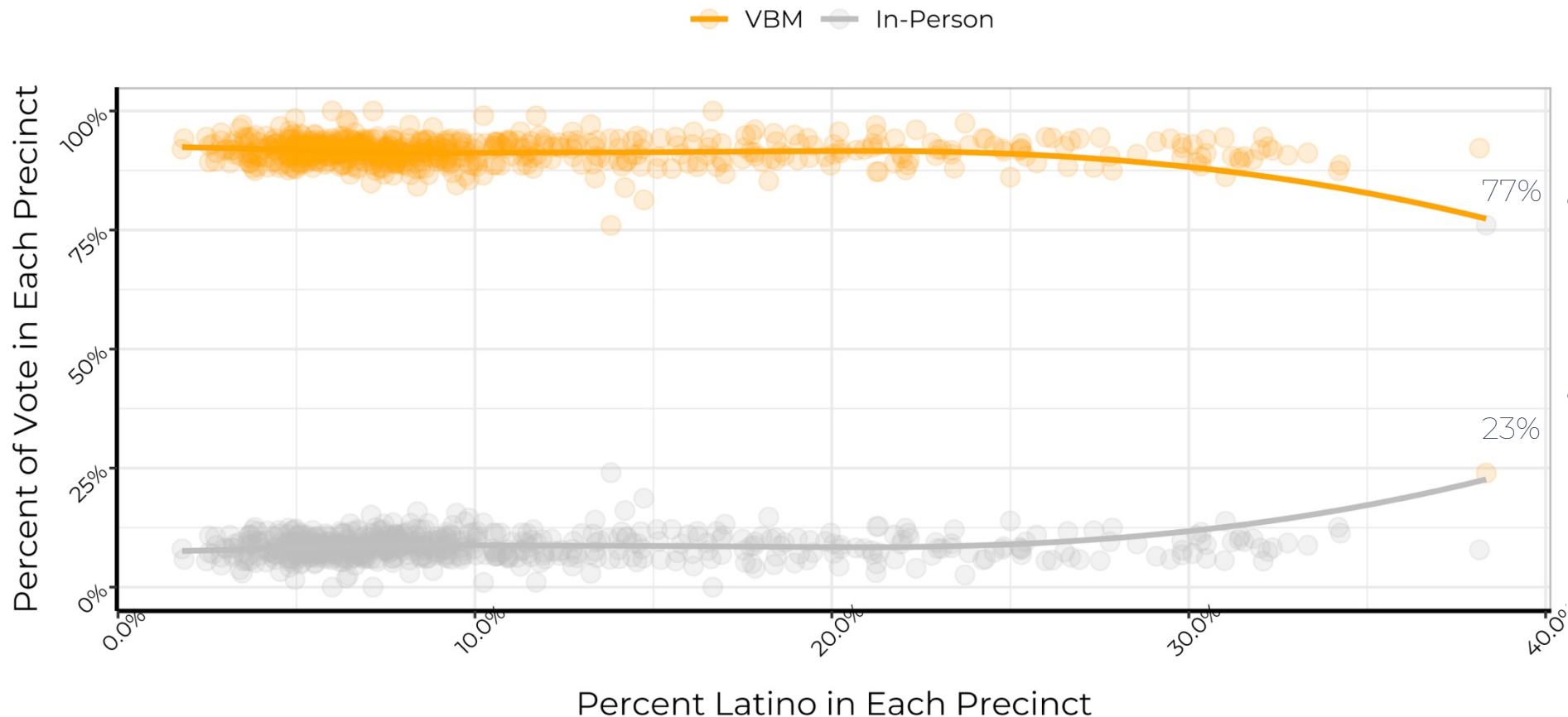

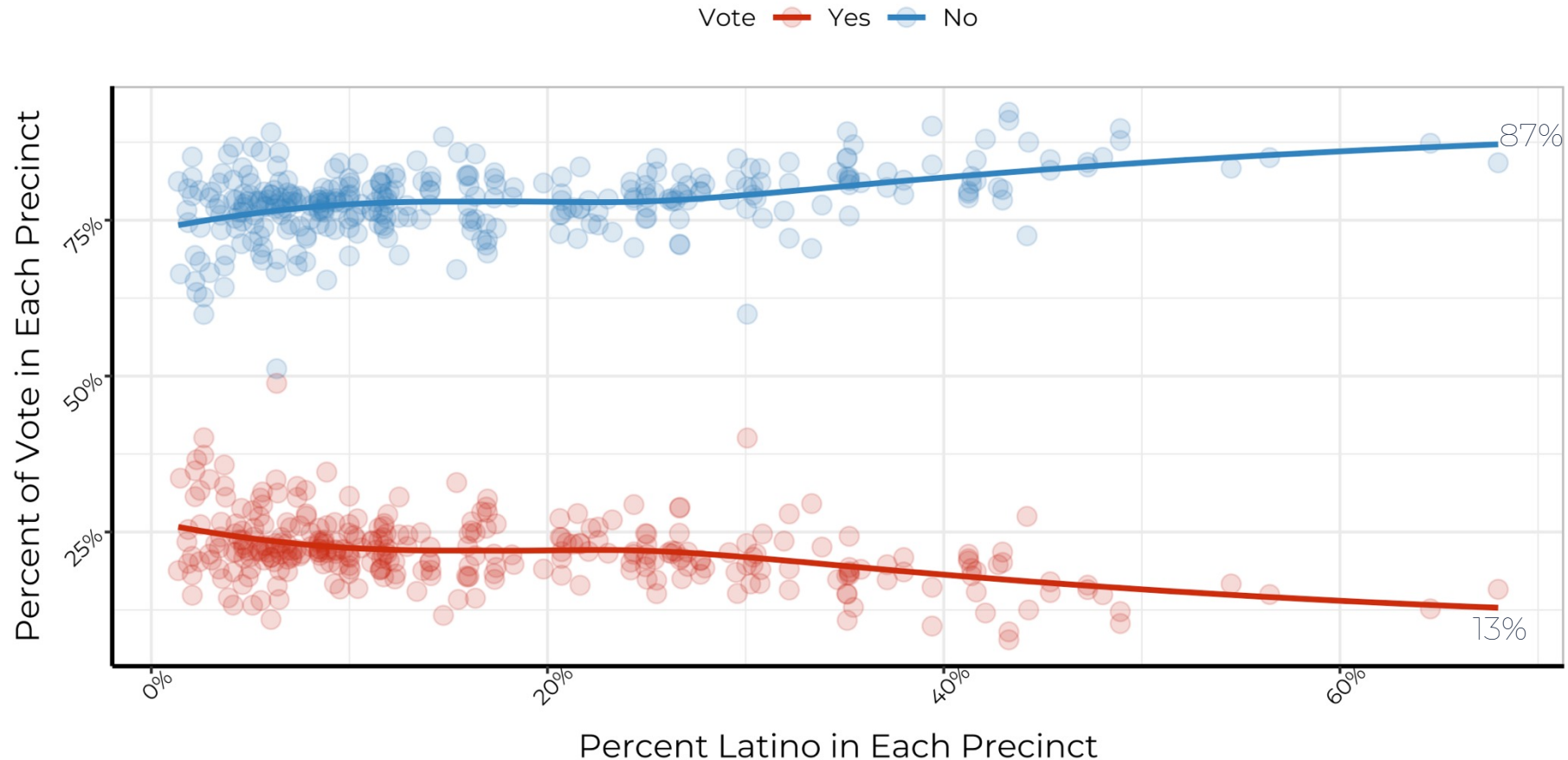

Sorted by Percent Latino within each Precinct



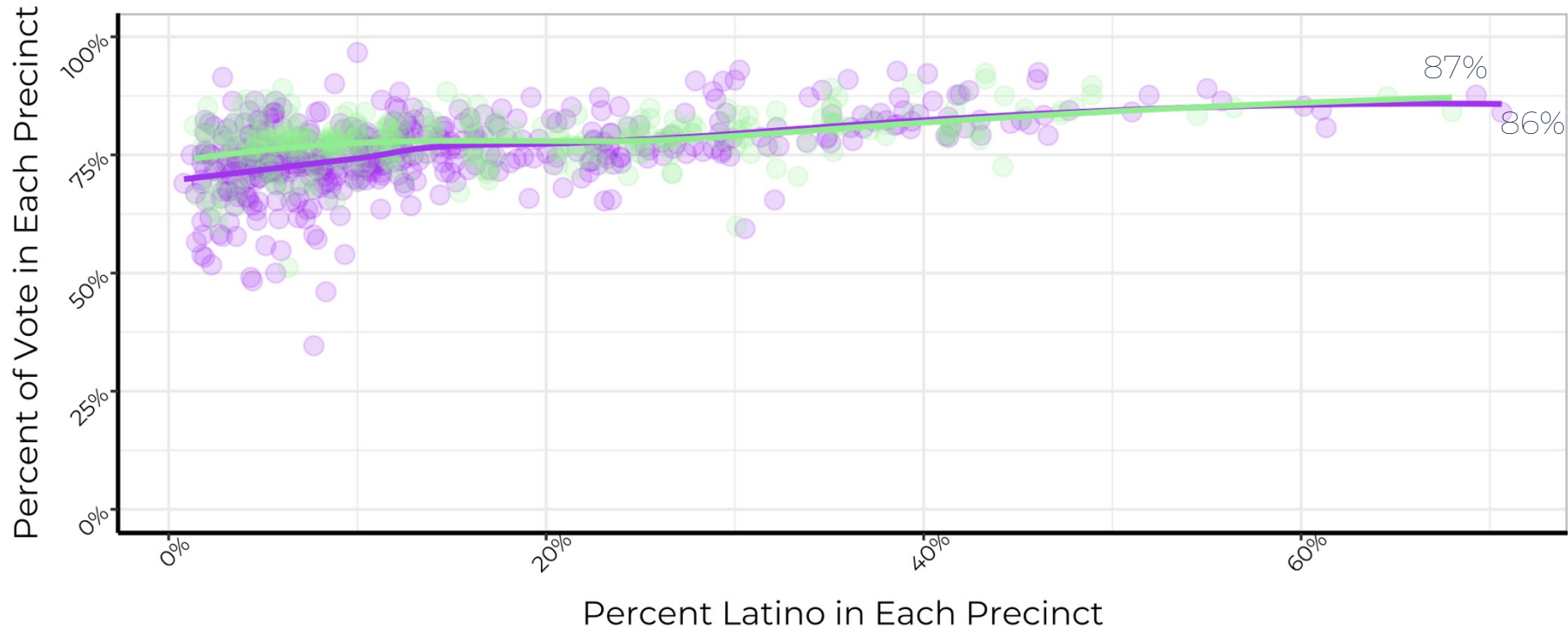

● Newsom ('18) ● NO on Recall ('21)



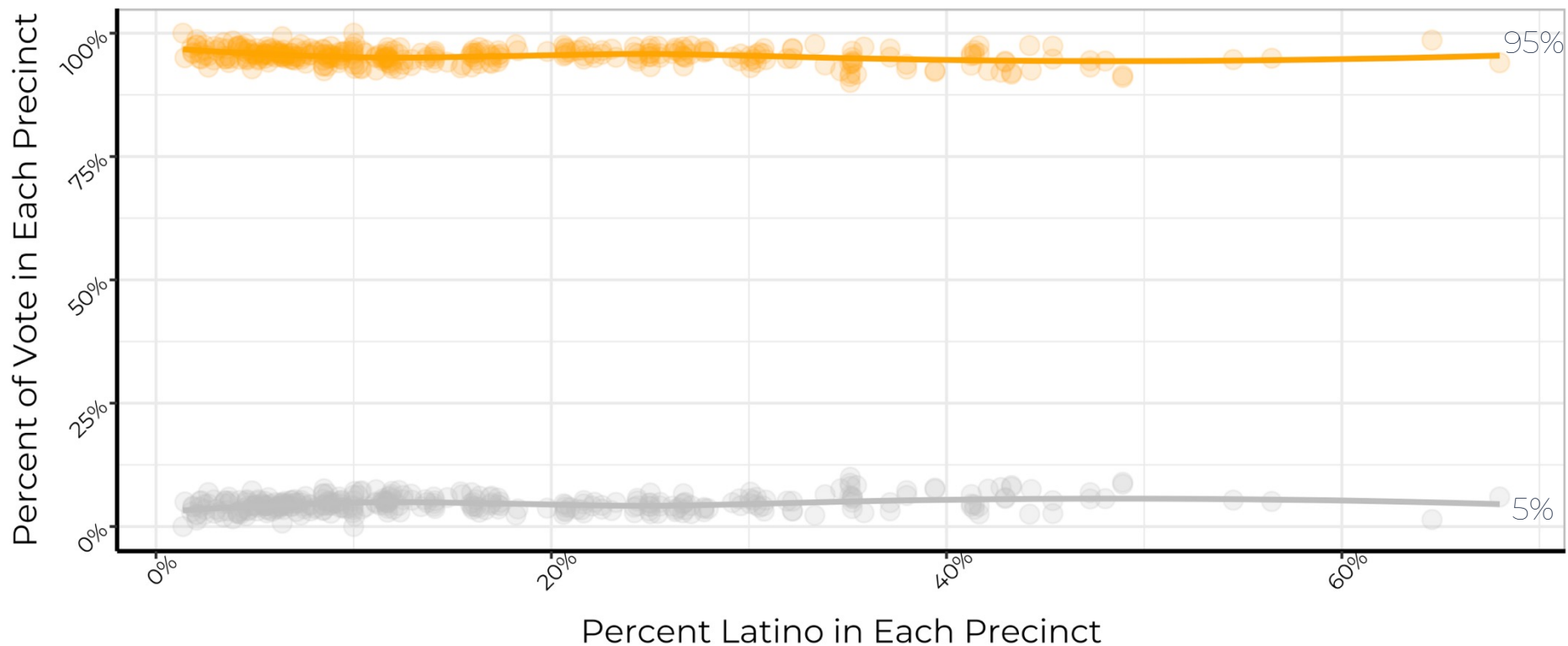

San Mateo County

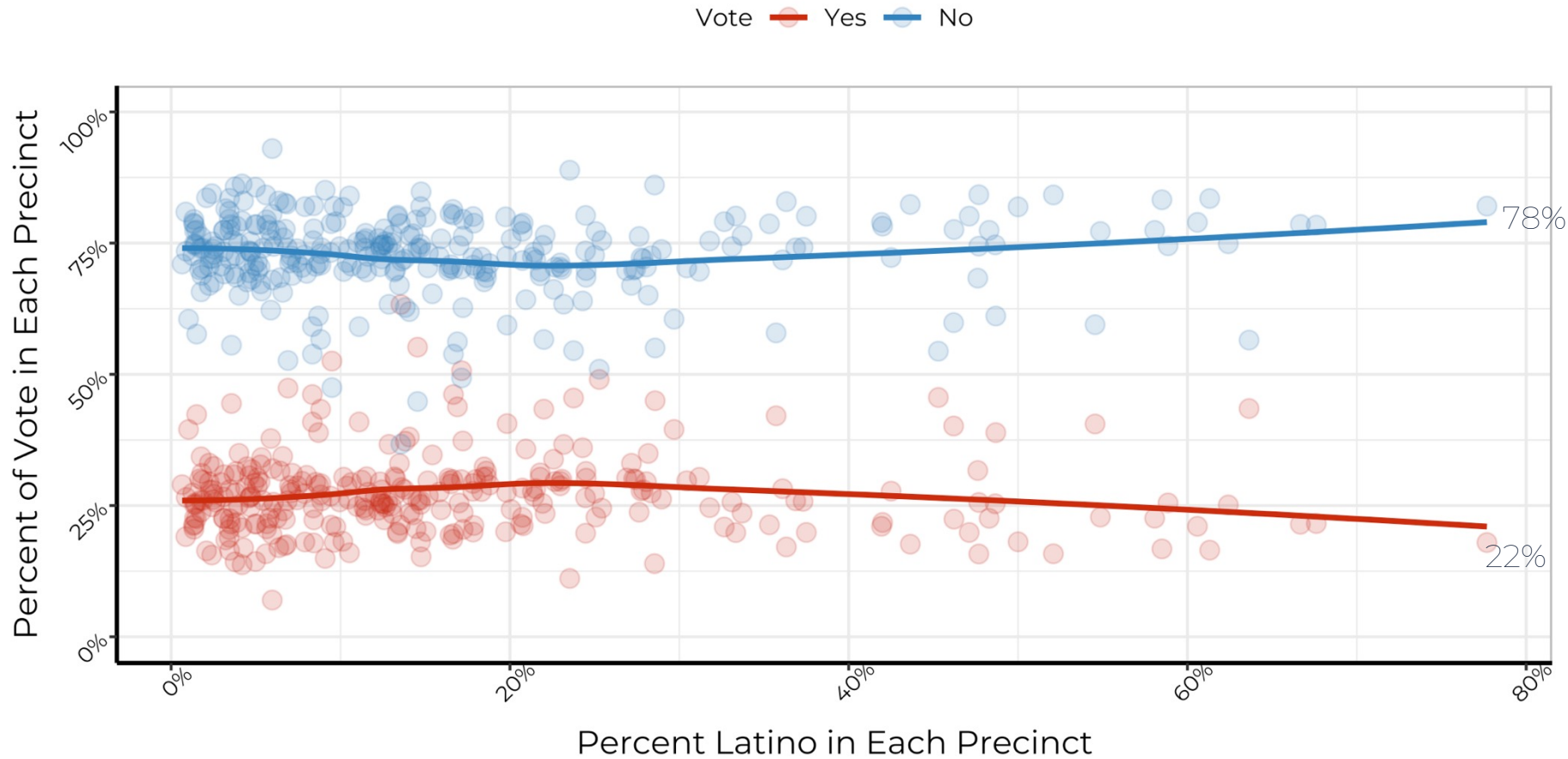

Sorted by Percent Latino within each Precinct



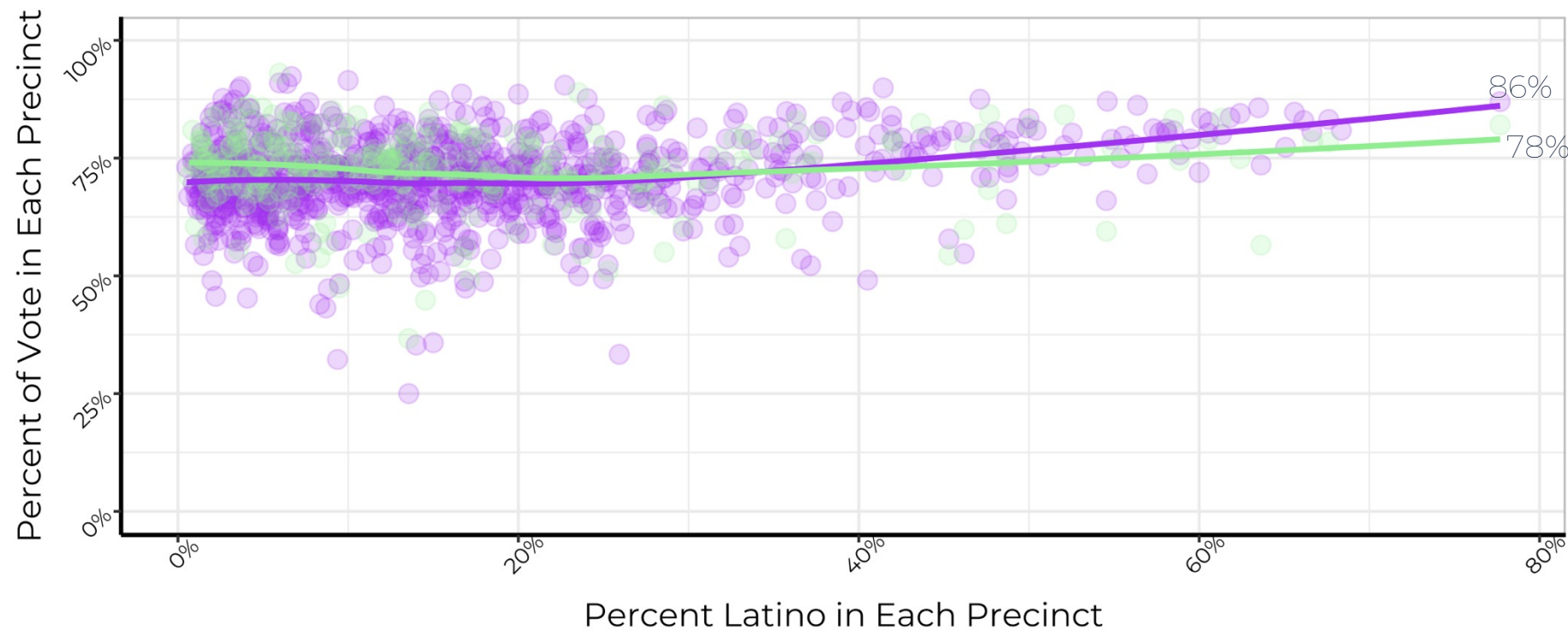

● Newsom ('18) ● NO on Recall ('21)



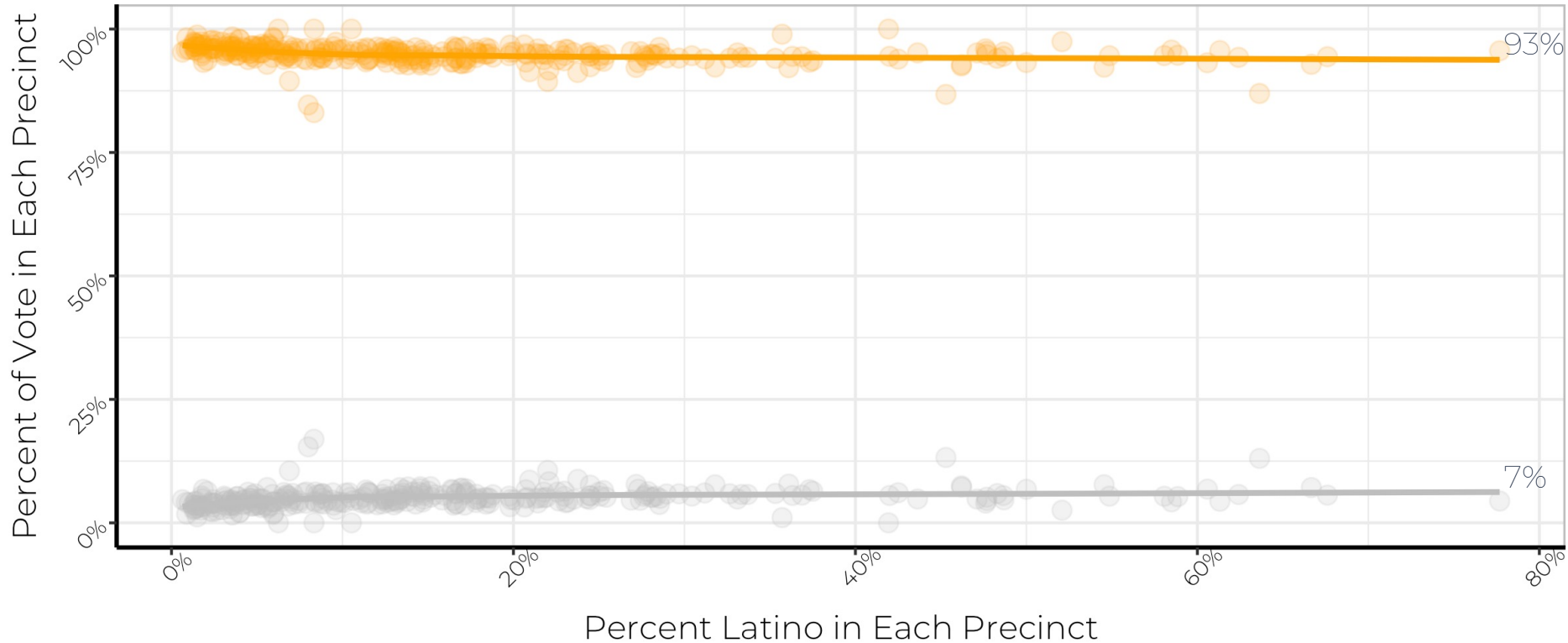

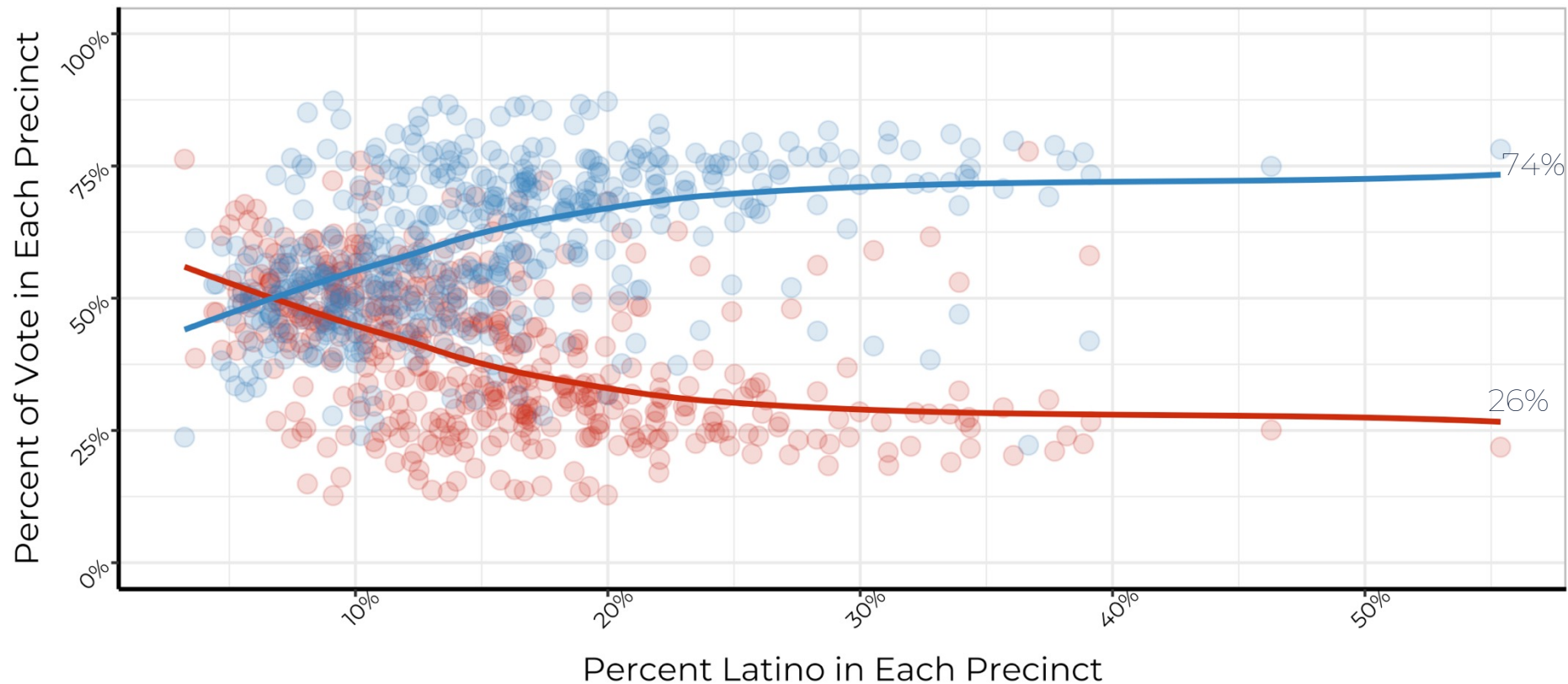

Vote ● Yes ● No



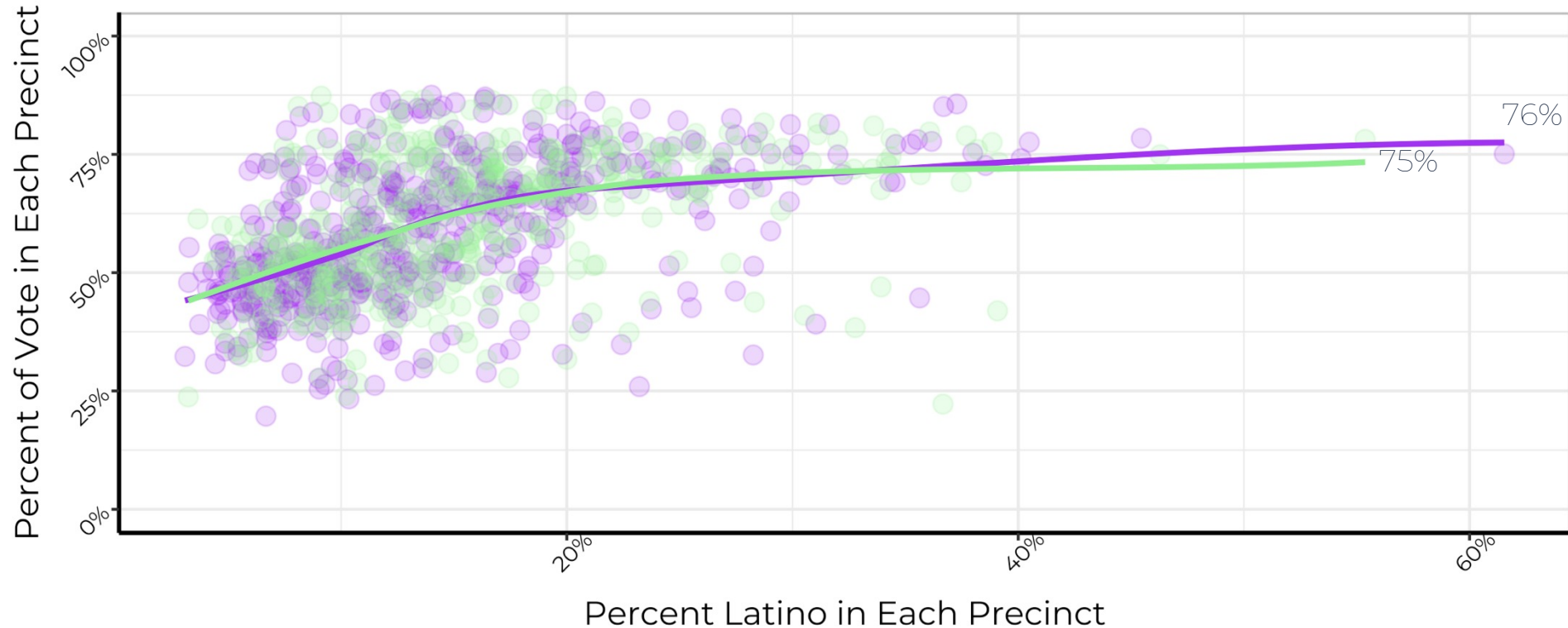

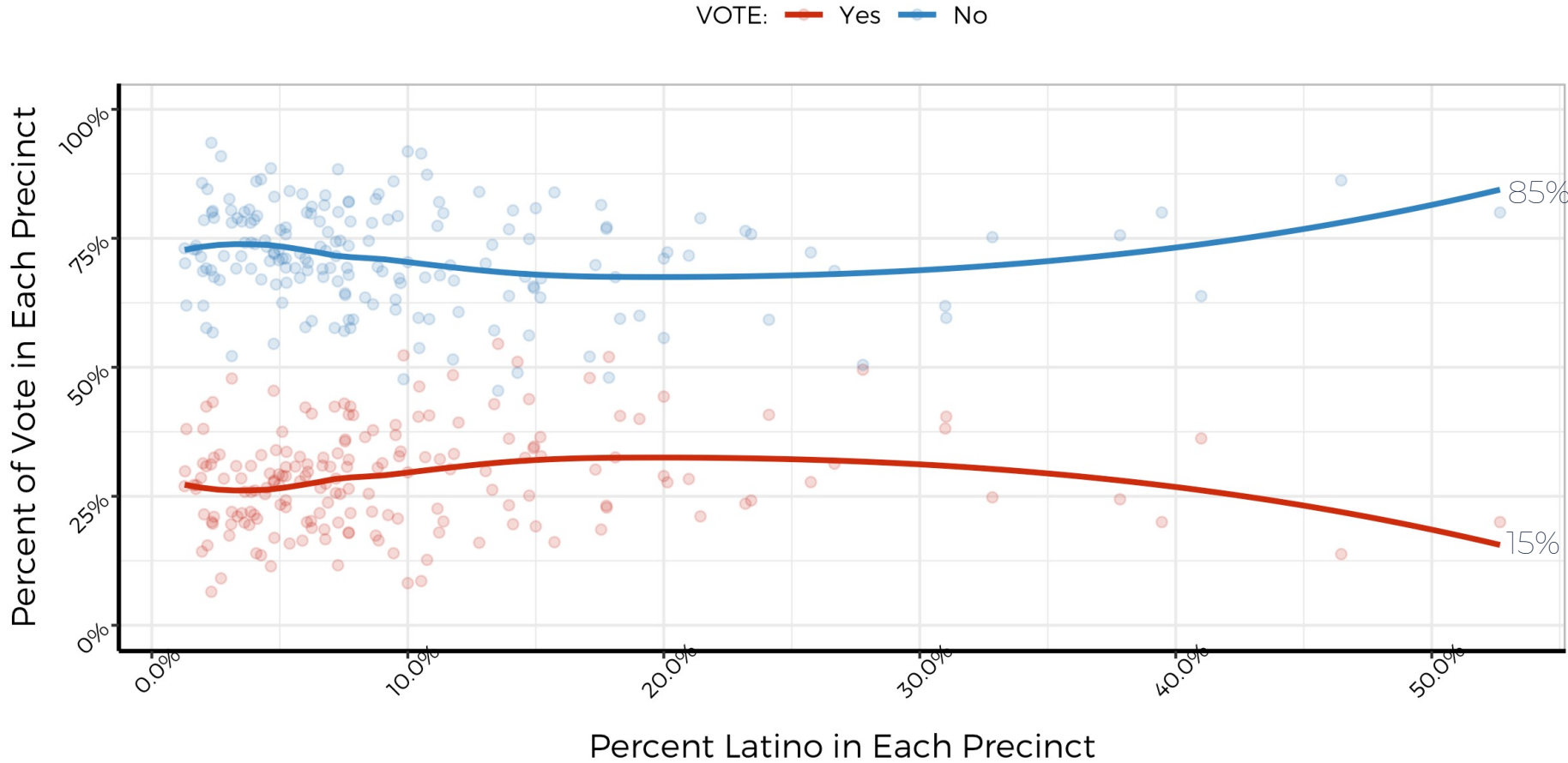


- 74% of voters in High-density Latino Precincts voted against the recall.

Sorted by Percent Latino within each Precinct

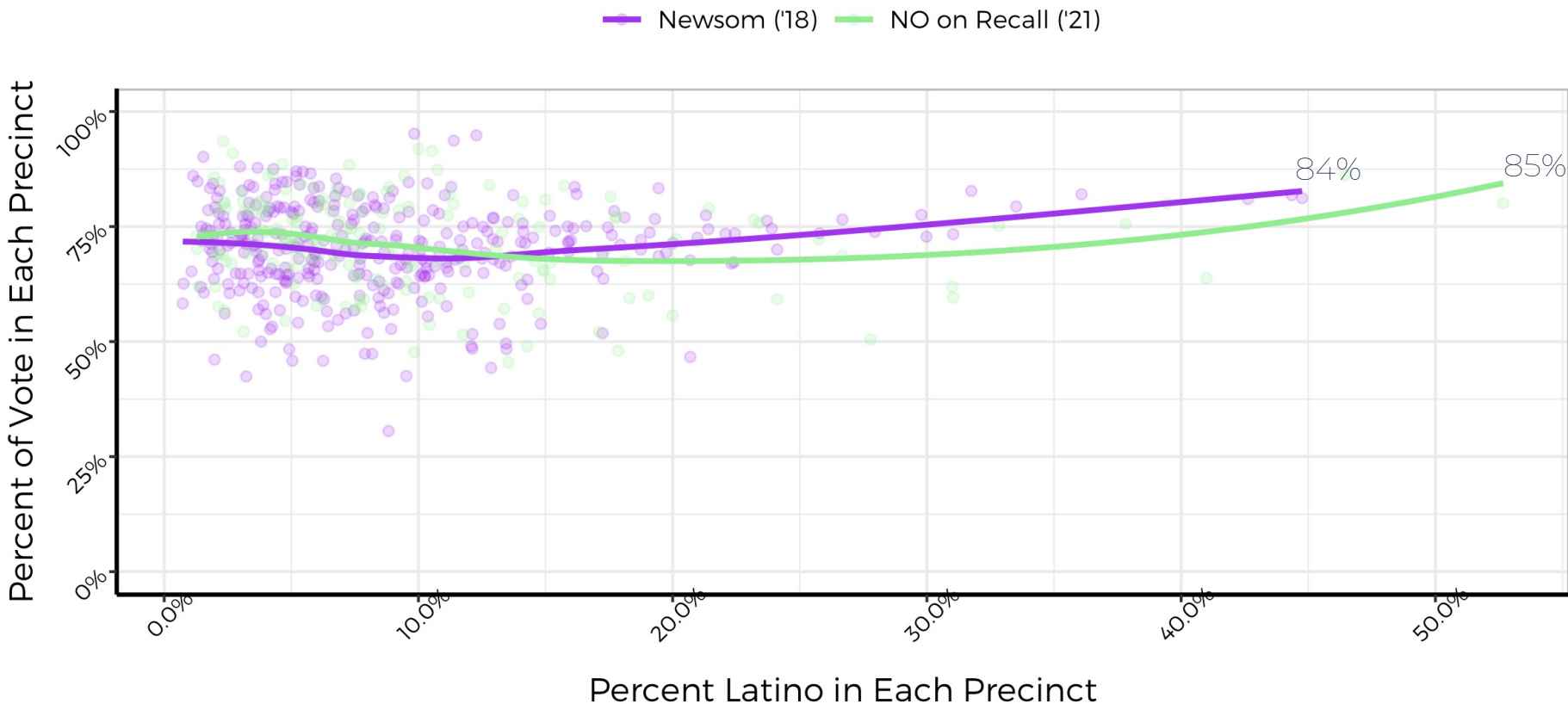

Sonoma County

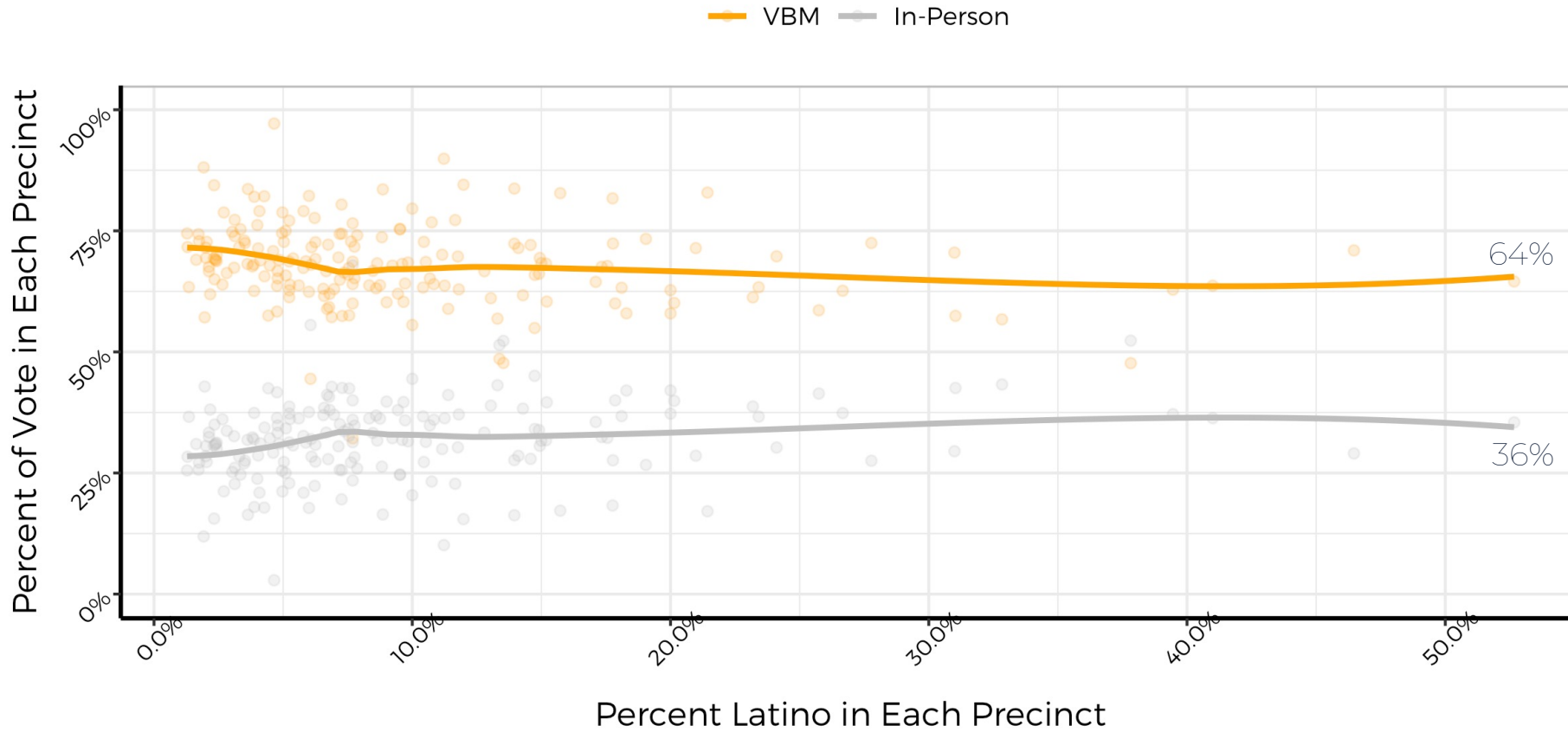


- In Sonoma County’s high-density Latino precincts, 85% of voters were against the recall.

- Sonoma had the highest in-person voting utilization rate of any Northern California county.

Conclusions

LATINOS VOTED LATER AND IN SUPPORT OF NEWSOM

- The biggest single day of Latino votes was 9/14—Election Day. The number of Latino votes roughly doubled over the final two days.
- Statewide, an estimated 78.1 percent of Latinos voted against the recall.

IN SOCAL, LATINOS SUPPORTED NEWSOM

- Even in traditionally Republican counties like Orange County, Latino support for Governor Newsom was upwards of 75 percent.

SUPPORT FOR NEWSOM AMONG LATINOS FELL IN THE INLAND EMPIRE

- Support for Governor Newsom, even in high-density Latino precincts, fell from 2018 levels.

IN CENTRAL CA, LATINOS VOTED IN STARK CONTRAST TO NON-LATINOS

- In Madera, Merced, Stanislaus, and Tulare Counties, Latinos overwhelmingly voted “No” on the recall, while non-Latinos overwhelmingly voted to remove Governor Newsom from office.

SUPPORT FOR NEWSOM AMONG LATINOS WAS STRONGEST IN THE BAY AREA

- In every Bay Area county analyzed, over three-quarters of Latinos voted “No” on the recall.
- Support for Governor Newsom was consistent between 2018 and 2021.

SUPPORT FOR NEWSOM CONSISTENT IN NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

- Support for Governor Newsom in Northern California counties was consistent between 2018 and 2021.
